NINETEENTH CENTURY OREGON POSTMARKS: MALHEUR, HARNEY AND WALLOWA COUNTIES

Malheur, Harney and Wallowa counties represent almost one-fifth of the total land area of Oregon, but their combined populations are small and the number of post offices which have served those hearty settlers is correspondingly few. In Malheur County there were some 38 offices established prior to 1900, a number which includes name changes and several short-lived facilities. Many of these offices were carried on the Baker County list, for Malheur County was not created until 1887. The arrival of the railroad in the northern part of Malheur County in the mid-1880's brought life to towns such as Ontario, Vale and Nyssa. Postmarks have been recorded from 15 Malheur County offices dating prior to 1900. Only four offices (Eldorado, Humboldt Basin, Malheur and Stone) are documented prior to the arrival of the railroad.

Harney County is a vast arid region containing 10,132 square miles. It is Oregon's largest, and was created in 1889. A total of 27 post offices were established here prior to 1900, but only two (Camp Harney and Alvord) operated prior to 1880. Postmarks have been recorded from 10 of the 27 offices; the earliest being an 1883 example from Camp Harney.


Wallowa County lies in Oregon's far northeast corner. Created in 1887, population has been largely concentrated to the beautiful Wallowa River Valley as represented by towns such as Wallowa, Joseph and Lostine. Four post offices (Wallowa, Prairie Creek, Alder and Lostine) were established prior to 1880. The last 20 years of the 19th century brought an additional 17 offices, including name changes. Thus far postmarks have been recorded from 14 of the county's 21 post offices prior to 1900.

In addition to the postmarks listed for Harney County, a manuscript marking from RILEY dated 13 March 1897 is known. The markings listed below form part of the 19TH CENTURY OREGON POSTMARK CATALOG. Persons who are able to add new information to this or other listings of 19th century Oregon postmarks are urged to contact either the author or LA POSTA's editor.





SATICOY CA 93003

Saticoy, California, is located nine miles west of the City of Ventura in an unincorporated part of the County f Ventura. The town was started in the 1860's, however it has never become an incorporated city.

The name Saticoy is derived from the name of a Chumash Indian Rancheria; although the meaning of the word is unknown (1). Father Serran of San Buenaventura Mission noted in the early 1800's, "this site (Saticoy) was abandoned by the 1780's though it still bore and bears its Indian name." (2) The name was also used in a land grant of some 17,700 acres in the 1840's Santa Paulay Saticoy Rancho.

The town of Saticoy was started in te late 1860's by E.B. Higgins. It was initially located approximately one mile west of the present site. The post office was established July 28, 1873, with Eugene Dunal as first postmaster.

In 1887 the Southern Pacific Railroad was building from Saugas through Ventura to Santa Barbara County. The railroad came close, but not through the town. A new town was started nearer the railroad, and the former townsite began to decline. The new town was also called Saticoy, and the former townsite became known as West Saticoy. The post office, which was still located in the old town, was closed on March 25, 1892. On April 25, 1892, it was re-established as West Saticoy, a 4th class office with George Walden as postmaster. This office was to last until May 15, 1913, when it was finally closed out to Ventura.

The Post Office Department re-established the Saticoy post office in the new town site on May 27, 1892. On November 1, 1959, it was converted to a Classified Branch of Ventura, and on April 1, 1974, the status was changed to Classified Station, which it remains to this day.

Saticoy enjoyed R.P.O. service between the arrival of the railroad and 1935. Postmarks used on this service were as follows: LOS ANGELES & SANTA BARBARA SAN FRANCISCO, SAN JOSE & LOS ANGELES SURREY & VENTURA OXNARD & VENTURA SAUGUS & VENTURA

The town also had H.P.O. service between September 2, 1957 and June 4, 1960. This service was provided by SANTA BARBARA & LOS ANGELES H.P.O.



THE POST OFFICES OF UTAH

Part XI: Millard County

Millard County is a land of mountain ranges and valleys. The east end follows mountain ridges, through which a gap found by Fremont in 1844 furnished a route for a wagon road via Round Valley on its way from Salt Lake City to southern California. Proceeding west is first the broad Pahvan Valley, and then a series of mountains and valleys to the Nevada line.

An important feature is Sevier Lake -- an expanse of marsh lands that give rise to the Sevier River, which in turn irrigates the fertile valley around Delta. The west end of the kounty is sparsely populated grasslands, perhaps best suited to grazing. Early prospectors found ore bodies worthy of mining, and no post office, except perhaps Ibex, could be said to have served a mining camp.

Millard County was erected in 1851 by the First Utah Legislature, and named in honor of President Millard Fillmore, who had signed the Utah organizing act the year before. Although the foundation for a capitol building had already been laid in Salt Lake City, the Territorial Legislature decided to locate the capitol in Millard County, some 150 miles southwest of Salt Lake City. The reasons for this choice are not entirely clear, but a good guess is that the dominantly Mormon Territorial Legislature had in mind "sagebrushing" the unwelcome territorial officers being appointed by the President.

Earlier in 1851 a settlement had been established by Anson Call at the place where the California Trail crossed Corn Creek. This location was strategic to support a colony and the post office at Centre Creek further south in Iron County. It was also anticipated that Congress would contract a mail route to San Diego via this route the following year. Call was appointed postmaster of the Corn Creek post office, but any mail dispatched during the year of its recorded existence was probably carried privately.


Meanwhile, Brigham Young selected a site on Chalk Creek, 15 miles northeast of Corn Creek, for the new capitol and named it Fillmore City to complete Utah's salute to the President. The name of the post office at Corn Creek was soon changed to Fillmore City. The facility was moved to the new site, taking Postmaster Call with it. The Legislature continued to meet in Salt Lake City until the new State House was completed in Fillmore City in 1855. The Utah Legislature convened in Fillmore City that year for the first and last time. The next Legislature, sitting in Salt Lake City, resolved to move the capitol back there, leaving the Old State House as a charming relic of Fillmore City's brief moment in the sun.

Even while the State House was under construction, Millard County was still little more than a dent in the frontier. Captain J.W. Gunnison was exploring the Sevier Valley for a transcontinental railway route when he was imbushed by Pah Ute Indians on October 25, 1853, and murdered along with seven others of his command. The tragedy for the Mormons was that Gunnison was one of the few gentiles of his time who understood them and their culture. His book on the Mormons of Utah is still an invaluable reference.

The old California Trail continued to furnish access through Millard County by way of Round Valley (Scipio), Fillmore, Holden, Meadow, Petersburg and Cove Creek until the Utah Southern Railroad was extended south across the county via the Pahvan Valley and on to Milford and Frisco in Beaver County in 1879. Railroad construction went on without end-of-the-line towns or post offices -- it was not then planned as a through route to California -- and few places along the present Union Pacific main line can claim the railroad as their principal reason for existence.

Most of the post offices in the county, other than the county seat at Fillmore, serve agricultural communities. Those around Delta are based on irrigated farming on the delta of Sevier Lake. Farmers around Flowell, Meadow, Hatton and Kanosh also irrigate, using streams which flow from the nearby mountains. The few post offices in the central and western parts of the county serve widely scattered ranches.

A total of 48 post office names are listed for Millard County. This number includes duplication of Deseret at different sites, and 10 name changes. Joeray and Pahvant probably did not operated under these names. Of the total, only 12 offices were still in existence in 1979.

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

Please allow me to express my appreciation for your patience in tolerating the diminished quality of printing which has plagued LA POSTA for the past few issues. The experiment with a computer based word processor has had some drawbacks in terms of reproduction quality, but I believe the problem is just about cleared up. This page, and several articles in this issue, are being set up with a new printer, which should produce a clear camera-ready copy. If the new process meets my expectations, LA POSTA should henceforth reach a new level in quality of format.

WYOMING POST OFFICES, 1850-1980 is the latest offering by John S. Gallagher and Alan H. Patera, those two most productive researchers of postal history. Published by The Depot, this 176-page cloth-bound volume is a most useful compendium of post office information for Wyoming. A county format is emphasized, and for each county a detailed locator map accompanies the post office listing and background information. There is an excellant introduction both to the early development of Wyoming and to the research methods employed by the authors. A section presents population data, and there is a master list of post offices arranged alphabetically for the entire state. This is a good useful basic reference on Wyoming post offices, and certainly deserves a place on the shelf of every Western Postal History library. To order write: The Depot, P.O.
