

U. S. Postal History in the Nineties

US postal history is alive and well! As our hobby enters its eighth decade, it continues to grow and change, showing vital signs of life.

Recent reports published in the weekly philatelic press have voiced fears over the future of stamp collecting because of the perceived lack of enthusiasm for the hobby by American teenagers. There was even an amusing flap over an ad campaign contrasting the "excitement" of collecting cards

featuring rock musicians with the "boredom" of stamp collecting. Believe it or not, writers found both good and bad omens for stamp collecting in this ad campaign. In the current vernacular, "Let's get real, dudes!"

Postal history, and for that matter serious philately, is rarely a hobby pursued by large numbers of teenagers. It never has been, and probably never will be. Think back, remember those long ago, hazy days when you were a teen. What were the things that most occupied your mind and time? How many of us can honestly say that postal history ranked very high on the list? Certainly not me, and I even have a few covers I prepared at age 16 which prove that I was one of those nerds who collected things other than phone numbers. Yes, I was interested in postal history as a teen, but my interest in certain phone numbers, cars, sports, college, and my immediate future was much consuming.

There has been a slow, but steady, growth in the popularity of U. S. postal history since the 1950's. A major increase in the amount of literature available on subjects ranging from state post office lists to railway postal markings, and even such arcane topics as Barr-Fyke machine cancels, has encouraged more and more folks to test the waters. Hopefully, most of those who have dared to try life without their catalog life jackets have discovered postal history to be a hobby which has an honest core. By that I mean not only that the vast majority of the people involved in postal history are honest, but that the collecting material itself is not subject to manipulation by private printing companies (sports trading cards) or governments (modern postage stamps).

Who are these people who become attracted to postal history as a hobby? Why does U. S. postal history continue to grow in popularity? Will postal history ever become such a popular hobby that your wife (husband) won't have to explain your avocation to the neighbors by mumbling something about "stamps and old letters"? These are difficult questions, and I can not guarantee the validity of my answers, but this is what I believe.

Postal history attracts curious people from a variety of other collecting hobbies. Naturally, most postal historians have come from philatelic backgrounds in the past, but more and more we are beginning to see people entering the field from deltiology (post card collecting) and other themespecific collecting areas. Some of these thematic collectors also collect stamps.

In a recent conversation with Colorado dealer Art Everett [Everett Philatelics of Black Hawk], Art related that he had recently returned from selling at a major topical show and was surprised at the interest in his cover stock by topical collectors seeking to add new dimensions to their collections. I asked Art if he would send me a list of the subjects which had elicited requests for covers, and he obliged as follows:

Art goes on to say that the serious topical collectors are not looking for First Day and other philatelically created covers. They want genuine commercial covers. They are also looking for town markings, such as the Bat collector who wanted La Cueva, NM, and the V.D. exhibitor who was looking for Shakespeare, NM, and they are looking for fancy cancels, especially including the 20th century fancies.

Our sincere thanks to Art and his wife Dot for that report on the pulse of topical cover collecting.

Thematic postal history, while still in its infancy, is almost certain to continue to increase in popularity. At the same time, we are seeing real growth in the number of people exploring more modern postal history subjects such as those related to 20th century U. S. stamp and postal stationery issues, World War II -- including postal markings and censorship of the mails, the expansion of airmail service, and the like.

More traditional U.S. postal history specialties such as geographic based, or state/county collecting; Confederate States; and RPO and Express covers continue to enjoy growth in the number of their adherents despite the passing of some of the collecting greats of the past generation.

As to whether or not the popularity of our hobby will ever reach the point that the general public becomes aware, I doubt it. The sad fact is, I have come to conclude, that most of our fellow humans care little for geography or history unless and until their lives become directly impacted by these subjects. As a matter of fact, when it comes to postal history collecting, the indifference of the masses is probably the very fact which will save the hobby. Just imagine the disaster which would soon occur to the supply of collectible covers if only a tiny fraction of the people who are currently sinking their money in baseball cards decided to become postal historians! We would literally run out of stuff to collect, and very quickly at that.

So, friends, my message is this. Don't worry about a lack of growth in the numbers of U. S. postal history collectors. Growth, along with diversity, is happening, and, while it's not very fast growth, that's all right because it does exceed the level needed for replacement of collectors leaving

the hobby. Frankly, the amount of collectable material could not sustain rapid growth and, I believe, our delightful little hobby would soon be ruined.

The last article began our listing of the Type A.1 devices. This article continues the alphabetical listing of this type, and includes a showing of new discoveries that would have been included last time if they were known. 

Unmailable - The Challenge

Auxillary markings provide interest and challenge to the owner regarding the particular marking. At times, the marking becomes a challenge - a piece of puzzle to solve. Such was the case I had when I recently aquired a postal card at an auction with the marking "unmailable" in red on the front (Figure 1).

At first glance the marking appeared unnecessary. After all, the card had the appropriate postage (a UX10 card that was being mailed locally). Was the address incorrect or indecipherable? No, it appeared to be easy to read. Now the challenge started - why was the "unmailable" marking applied?

I reviewed the index to La Posta to see what articles were available. In the January 1986 issue of La Posta and March 1986 issue, Randy Stehle had two articles that dealt with "auxillary markings -unmailable". Since I have been a subscriber of La Posta for a short period of time (this journal is a must for a student of postal history), I contacted Susan Dixon at the American Philatelic Research Library and requested the copies. As I waited for the journals, the challenge of the hunt became more exciting. Upon receipt of the journals, I read both articles by Mr. Stehle. Well written and thoroughly researched, they gave insights into the markings of "unmailable". He extracted from the Postal Laws and Regulations the reasons for determining mail as

"unmailable". Briefly: Insufficiently prepaid, misdirected, harmful, mutilated, improper weight or size, obscene and scurrilous, defamatory or threatening material. In the March 1986 issue of *La Posta*, Mr. Stehle wrote in greater detail about why the "unmailable" marking was applied to mail and obscene matter.

Inspection of the postal card for an infraction of one of the postal laws, as it relates to unmailable, was conducted. Postage was correct, the address was readable, size was proper, and it did not appear obscene, mutilated, misdirected, or harmful. The challenge had begun! Information about this card would require some digging. I received the *Postal Laws and Regulations* for 1893.

Deciding to pursue the text from the beginning so as to become more familiar with it, I finally unlocked some clues on page 207. Section 473 - "mail matter other than second class, deposited in any post office for mailing, must bear a postmark giving name of post-office, name or abbreviation of the state, or name of railway post-office, and, on first-class matter, the date of deposit. All classes of correspondence addressed to foreign countries must be impressed at the mailing office with a stamp indicating the office of origin and date of posting. No offices are exempt from the requirements of this section."

The postal regulations were very clear about this regulation and even stipulated that impressions must be taken of the post marking stamp (Section 474) in a book spe-






cially provided for this purpose, so as to attest to the compliance of the regulation. The book or record was required to be kept for two years then it was allowed to be sold as waste paper.

Apparently, I concluded, a knowledgeable postal worker saw the partial impression on the card and decided that it did not comply with Postal regulations of 1893, Section 473 and declared it "unmailable".

I made a photo copy of the card and wrote to Mr. Stehle to see if my conclusions had validity. He indicated that it indeed was an interesting marking, but he could not see any reason why the marking applies. Although the cancel impression was incomplete, he did not think it would make the card unmailable. Perhaps the marking is not legitimate? Well, the challenge is now open to anyone willing to accept it. Requests for photocopies of the card or any other information necessary to continue the challenge are welcomed (as well as conclusions drawn). Please write to Mario C. Barbiere in care of La Posta.

In the meantime, there is another postal card I'm researching regarding "unmailable". Reader response welcomed.



Double Ovals and Postal Notes (from Jim Noll, of Escondido CA)

As a reader of *La Posta* and a Postal Note collector, I would like to comment on the items on page 55 of the January 1991 issue.


You report that you received a letter from Fred Lightfoot, a Greenport NY paper [ephemera] dealer, in which he stated that "sub-stations postmarked only registered mail and, presumably, Postal Notes."

It is this last item I may be able to add some data on. I feel it is very unlikely that the Double Ovals, which are the subject of the material Mr Lightfoot is referring to, would be used on Postal Notes because the cancels bear no date. In the issue and redemption of Postal Notes the date is very important as the notes had a limited period of validity: three months from the last day of the month of issue. In the design requirements for the second Postal Note type, reading the cancel date was felt to be so important that the shading of the cancel circle as used in the first Postal Note type, was deleted.

NEW YORK "U.D." DOUBLE OVAL


Speaking of Fred Lightfoot, here is a gift to us from him from a month or two back. What is the answer to the following query?

What does the "U.D." and the "I.D." (next page) refer to in these NYC ovals; were they used properly?



...possibly of interest to you. The post card's oval seems to have "UD" in the center. Since the card is addressed to a Navy ship, maybe the "U" is for "US Government?" Some N.Y. City specialist may have answers on these.

... by these Presents that we William Shepard jr of Plainfield in the County of Windham and State of Connecticut as principal and Elkanah C Enton of Plainfield as Surity are holden

and firmly bound unto George A Paine of Woodstock in said County in the sum of five hundred dollars to be paid to the said Paine his heirs and assigns, to the payment whereof we jointly and severally bind ourselves and our respective heirs firmly by these presents, signed with our hands and sealed with our seals this day of March AD 1866.

The condition of this obligation is such that whereas the said Wm Shepard jr has contracted and agreed with the said Paine (a Contractor with the Post Office Department of the United States) to carry the mails on Route No 920 between Plainfield and Westminster, for the remainder of the term of four years from July 1st 1865 to July 1st 1869 for the sum of two hundred & eighty dollars per annum in quarterly payments, according to the terms of the contract between the said Paine and the Post Master General, and to be subject to the same liabilities and changes &c as the said Paine and to save him harmless from any fines or forfeitures incurred in consequence of failure to fulfil said contract. 

OVAL CANCELS FOR CIRCULARS AND OTHER PURPOSES

It has been most Interesting to follow the discussions of the oval cancels (*La Posta*, May and November 1990), especially those parts concerning the numbers in the center of the cancel. It is important to remember that the Post Office was not a monolithic organization. There were regulations, but individual postmasters had leeway in observing them.

There were single line, Figure 1, as well as double line ovals, but a few offices used other types of cancels. The aim was a marking which was easily distinguished from those of the usual first class cancel, but which named the town and state.

The unusual cancel in Figure 2 met the requirements of an undated cancel showing town and state. It illustrates that there was some freedom on the part of postmasters in choosing to place a cancel in operation. Still, the fact that so many wide-spread offices used the same variety of cancel indicates that they were listed for this purpose in catalogs supplied from Washington to all post offices.

EASE OF RECOGNITION

The desire to include the town and state of origin was obvious but there were several reasons for omitting the date and time. The foreign mail cover shown next is of interest to me especially because it illustrates one of the motives I think influenced the design of the oval types.

Usually mentioned is that circulars were given lower priority in handling over first class, and this is true. However, circulars were not inordinately delayed since many had time-sensitive notices of coming events or sales and had to be delivered within reasonable time. Another reason given is postal convenience: it was not necessary to change time every half hour and the date every day.

THE MOST IMPORTANT REASON

A third important reason was ease of recognition. If all mail were to be canceled alike, with standard first class handstamps, a receiving office would not know whether a piece stamped at the circular rate was in fact fully paid or whether it had passed unnoticed, mis-rated, through the

and "RD" for Registry Division, and various other combinations, are found inside ovals too.

office of origin. A distinctively-shaped marking for circular mail showed knowledgeable handling. A dated first class marking on a circular-rated piece would be open to question. The New York foreign division marking cover shown has the month day and year included, but the double oval shape clearly indicates a circular rate, estimated at about 1888-92.

COMPETITION FOR USE

The double ovals were put into use in many larger cities at a time when the quantities of circular rate mail was increasing, and a great deal of mail received these cancels during the 1880s and 1890s. However, there were also several factors which tended to reduce their use.

First was the proliferation of canceling machines during this period. Many offices could accumulate a quantity of envelopes with enclosed circulars and, after removing date and time slugs from the canceling dial, run them through the machine.

Second was the increasing use of precanceled stamps. In the 1890s more and more postmasters experimented with the idea and some let their imaginations run wild. Philadelphia's first precancel was the local on the three cent issues of 1895. The post office finally issued regulations to restrict the format of precancels on May 23, 1903.

Third was that, starting in 1904, mailing by permit, without adhesive stamps, was authorized but since this was for quantity mailings, it affected mostly the machines' canceling tasks. However, the two previous reasons greatly reduced the need and use of the double oval on circular rate mail

While the use of double ovals was reduced for circular cancellation, they did not disappear. Some circulars were still mailed in small quantities with stamps attached, sometimes in wrappers, or in envelopes too large or too flimsy for a machine. There was much use of Double Ovals for registry use as well. The letters "CR" for "circular rate"

GENERAL PURPOSE, TOO

The cancels were also found very convenient as general purpose obliterators for postage due stamps, uncanceled stamps skipped during ordinary canceling, etc. In the cities large enough to have stations or branches, these were supplied with double oval handstamps too.

After surviving the impact of both machine canceling and precancelled stamps, starting in 1912 the double ovals found a new and busy field. The parcel post system was entirely revised and was made competitive with other methods of delivery then in use.

The use of the parcel post system by business and the public in general kept increasing and the packages did not lend themselves to machine cancelers. Precancels were not much used for this purpose because it was usual to take packages to the post office and have the rate figured there. The use of many stamps on the parcels made the double ovals the cancel of choice.

STATION NUMERALS

The first double ovals appeared about 1880. Soon, both Philadelphia and New York eventually used numbers inside a double oval to indicate numbered stations. In the case of Philadelphia, the cancels did not begin this way. There is no doubt in my mind that, when the short-lived, single-line oval started in Philadelphia, about 1879, and initially for the Double Ovals which soon followed, the numbers simply indicated the handstamp's control number.

During the late 1890s or early 1900s, letters and distinct station numbers appeared within the oval markers. Some station letters also are followed by a number; it indicated the handstamp control number. "G3" thus would show that it was one of (at least) three handstamps of Philadelphia's

Germantown Station (G.)

In Philadelphia, in 1890, there were 27 offices listed as "Post-Office Stations," all of which received and delivered mail. All of these had names, none were numbered. In 1891, the listing became:

Letter-Carrier Stations 14Postal Stations 5

-Receiving Stations 17, numbered 1 through 17.

By 1902, in addition to the Central Office, there were 30 letter carrier stations listed. The numbered ones had reached 148 and these offices were now termed "Sub-Stations." There were four named stations listed in this same category. namely Pittville, Oxford Church, Fern Rock, and Lawndale.

The illustrated covers that follow prove that both Philadelphia and New York City did use Sub-Station numbers inside their Double Oval cancels. It is likely that stations other than those shown follow the same pattern, but we cannot be certain of them until we see examples. To be certain if an enclosed numeral indicates a distinct station number, rather than a control number, it must be on cover combined with some other wording or marking to sustain the identification. Such covers are scarce.

NEW YORK AND THE SEAPOST

New York City, with its many large stations handling great volumes of parcel post, was a prolific user of the Double Oval, particularly in the 1920s.

The Seapost Registry cancel on the reverse of the cover below is scarce. It is my belief that the New York Foreign Division sent registered mail to the ships in packets, bundled and listed for the scheduled ports-of-call. Clerks in the Seapost did not disturb the packets, merely backstamping the bottom letter of each. Thus there would be very few such cancels on any one voyage.

PHILADELPHIA 22 AND 56

In the case of Philadelphia, many stamps are found with numbers in the oval, but it is hard to decide whether


Fig 4: Letter malled at Station No. 166, seen in both the oval and the registry box, on Feb 5, 1909. It was sent to the Foreign Division room where the label was placed on the front, backstamped the same day, then sent to the ship the next day and received the Registry handstamp verification of the U.S. Seapost.

it is a Main Office or station cancel. I estimate that the Main Office's numbers reached to about #40, and that there they changed to the blank Double Oval type, without number, in the early 1920s. This is hard to prove but it is simply better than nothing.




Fig 5: The Station 22* Double Oval, with confirmation via the backstamps; "22*" was the public area of Broad Street Station, Oct 18, 1926.

The cancel in Figure 5 shows an asterisk following the

The cancel in Figure 5 shows an asterisk following the 22. This is probably to differentiate the cancel from a "22" cancel currently or previously in use at the Main Office.




Fig 6: Philadelphia Sub-Station 56, as seen in both the oval and the registry handstamp. On Oct 12, 1900, No. 56 was at 5th and Glenwood. Later No. 56 was transferred to Reading Terminal's public area. There was an additional No. 56 Parcel Post Annex on Filbert Street (under the "bridge.")

The cancel of Figure 6 is of interest in that it not only affirms that numbers in the Double Ovals could represent designations but it also establishes an early date of occurrence. Station No. 56 was assigned to a location at Fifth and Glenwood in 1899. It was listed there for 1900 and 1901 but was transferred to the northeast corner of 12th and Market Streets (the Reading Terminal Station) in 1902. Such changes were common enough to complicate determination of a particular location for a given number.






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W Y O M I N G D O A N E S

The Wyoming Doane list is the result of information received from many sources. So that Wyoming collectors would be reached for their input, a preliminary list was published in the January 1989 issue of Wyoming Collector. This list consisted of information received by Alan Patera, Lynn Langdon and from the Summer 1982 La Posta (Vol. 13, No. 3/4) listing of Western Doanes. Since then, additional data have been furnished by collectors and dealers and also acquired by browsing through dealers' stock.

The illustrations in "Wyoming Doanes" have been made available through the courtesy of LaMar Peterson (DALLAS type 1c Doane), LJP Stamp Services and other collectors.

This compilation is founded on a database that includes a

record of basically all postmarks reported or observed regardless of their collectability. So far, there is no Wyoming Doane so plentiful that the recording of every example becomes unnecessary. In Colorado, however, HALFWAY type 3 and SULPHUR SPRINGS are very common, and the ARROW type 3 cancelled during the summer months are common enough so that only those that contain additional useful information are entered into the database. ARROW type 3 summer cancels are well documented because many post cards were mailed by people who took summer train trips to the mountains, but winter months are sought because these are not plentiful.

CHANGES TO THE 1982 WYOMING LIST

44 Doane cancels have been added to the Wyoming list since the 1982 <u>La Posta</u> list of Western Doanes was published: 2 additional type 1s, 20 type 2s, 21 type 3s and 1 with unidentified type.

Examination of Wyoming Doanes has prompted the following changes to the 1982 listing:


TYPE NUMBER CHANGES

ARCOLA now type 2a was type 3
WINCHESTER now type 3b was type 2
DOANE NUMBER CHANGES

GARLAND changed to a 5 from a 6 changed to a 3 from an 8 WYNCOTE changed to a 3 from a 2.

WYOMING POST OFFICES WITH DOANE POSTMARKING DEVICES

77 Wyoming post offices were established, re-established or changed names during the period known to have produced the Doane canceller. These 77 post offices, from data published in <u>The Daily Postal Bulletin</u>, have been




This type 1a-3 FORT RUSSELL Doane is the first of two Doane replacements for this post office.

designated by a "+" in front of the year of establishment in the present listing of Wyoming Doanes. A total of 41, or 53%, of these have been found and recorded. 36 have yet to be reported. At present, these 77 post offices represent a maximum of 44% of the Wyoming post offices that had or should have received a Doane postmark.

To date, 96 Wyoming post offices that were operating prior to the issuance of Doane cancellers are known to have received Doane devices as replacement equipment. FORT RUSSELL, GLENDO and WAMSUTTER of this group received two Doane replacements. SHOSHONI and CARNEYVILLE are post offices that opened during the Doane period and received Doane replacements, although the first CARNEYVILLE Doane has yet to be reported. DALE CREEK has the distinction of being established and re-established during the Doane period. Only the "re-established Doane" has been recorded so far.

A total of 141 Wyoming Doane postmarkers have been recorded to date. There are no reported mimics or modified Doanes for Wyoming. Of type 1, nine, or 6% of the total, have been recorded; type 2: 75, or 53%, type 3: 56, or 40%, and 1, OSMOND, is not identified by type.

The earliest recorded Wyoming Doane is the WID-DOWFIELD type 1a-1 of 2 Nov 1903.



The community of TIE SIDING is pictured on a blueprint-type real photo post card cancelled in 1912. The TIE SIDING Doane is one of the most frequently recorded Wyoming Doanes.

ARAPAHOE, BRIDGER, NATRONA, PATHFIND-ER, WATSON and WIND RIVER had been created by name changes during the Doane period. No reports about NATRONA and WATSON cancels have been received.

CORBETT, DALE CREEK, HAMSFORK, HOBART, MILFORD and RIVERSIDE post offices were re-established during the Doane period. Of these, CORBETT, HOBART and RIVERSIDE are unreported. KEY-STONE can also be included because the post office existed previously.

Type 2a, which makes up 40% of the total, and type 3b together make up 66% of all the Doane types issued. This number should rise as the unknown subtypes of types 2 or 3 become known.

At the present time, the most common Wyoming Doanes are TIE SIDING, BIRDSEYE, DOWNINGTON and the type 3b-8 FORT RUSSELL for both periods.

RECORDED DATA

Only reported or verifiable information is recorded except where noted by a question mark when letters, numbers or killer bars are not clear enough for positive identification. A Doane or 4 bar cancel must have sufficient evidence that its type can be established without question. If there is any doubt which type of device produced the cancel, it has not been recorded in the database as fact. Type 3b Doanes and type 4A 4 bars are especially troublesome because the killer bars are identical except for the presence or absence of a number.

Once a number in the bars for a particular Doane cancel is identified, all reported cancels are assigned to the same group even when some of the strikes do not show the number. Though this assumption is not without risk, the odds would be favorable in most cases. When the SHOSHONI type 3b-11 was first recorded, this made all

of the type 3b-1 entries suspect. Therefore, noted that SHOSHONI number 1 data is basically incorrect and any new SHOSHONI postmarks will require number identification before a strike can be recorded. To indicate this problem, the Doane number in the list has been changed to a "?1." If you have examples of the SHOSHONI postmarks, please check them and send in your findings so the data can be corrected.

All reports, regardless of the amount of information included, are considered important and are recorded.

The following data, when known, is included in the master database but not shown in the present summary listing.

INDICIA is recorded exactly as it appears in the cancel. Any inverted characters are noted, as are solid blocks, a result of inserting inverted type. These are noted by Xs.

POSTAL USAGE is recorded for each. This includes originating, cancelling, forwarding, receiving and transit cancels.

COVER TYPE is recorded for each, if known, and includes envelope (either stamped or entire and designated as "cover"), government postal card, registry card (specific if known), private post card or "on piece."

POSTMARK COLOR is recorded if known. Patterns are already showing up for a few post offices.


ANYTHING OUT OF THE ORDINARY is noted.

Damage to the canceller, the arrangement of the killer bars with respect to the dial or anything unusual about the cancel is recorded.



The ARCOLA Lyp. here used as a transit marking. It is possible trial post card was missent to ARCOLA, the next town to the west on the railroad, on its journey to CARPENTER, Wyoming from Kansas. However, lacking evidence that the card was missent makes this a transit postmark.

4 BAR USAGE is recorded for all "Doane towns" and, if known, by Helbock 4 bar types as described in "Postmarks and Cancellations" by Richard W. Helbock and Dan Meschter in La Posta, Vol. 17, No. 4. These dates help to determine when a Doane canceller was "retired," usually when a 4 bar was supplied to the post office. Occasionally a Doane is resurrected at a later date, creating a new period of use. Only additional records can confirm if it is incidental or not. In a few cases, another Doane canceller or other type of device may have been the replacement.



The two examples above are type 3b Doanes. The DOWNINGTON type 3b(-2) is a style that carried over into the 4 bar period as type 4Aa.

4 BAR TYPES that replaced Doanes would be the 4A and 4B represented in the examples. Helbock notes two styles of lettering for the 4A type, a pointed A and a flat topped A. I

have designated the pointed A subtype as "a" and the flat topped A as "b." The two styles can be easily distinguished by the general shape of the letters as seen in the examples.

PREDOANE CDS CANCELS are also recorded in order to help establish the date on which a post office received a Doane canceller. Information is very scarce here because covers from the small post offices are generally hard to find. The Doane canceller, because it was made of rubber, does not permit uniform strikes; therefore, the recording of diameters is not considered. As an experiment, the diameters of about 50 or so acceptable Colorado Doane cancellations were measured. The measurements were recorded for north-south and east-west orientation. Of those measured, less than five were circles; the rest were ellipses. However, there is definitely a range of measurements that may be traced to a particular craftsman because Doane cancellers contain many minor variations.

ARRANGEMENT OF DATA IN THE SUMMARY COMPILATION

TOWN or POST OFFICE

The SPELLING of a post office name in this list is based on the spelling in the Doane canceller and may differ from the "official" name. In a few instances, a Roman numeral appears after a name. This indicates that a Doane canceller was resurrected at a later date after 4 bar use was recorded. A Roman numeral designates the individual period of use, although such a designation may be only temporary because additional information may change the picture.

TOWNS PRINTED IN LOWER CASE CHARAC-TERS at the end of the list are post offices that opened during the period (as published in <u>The Daily Postal Bulletin</u>) when Doane postmarkers were issued but for

which no examples have yet been recorded. The expected type and number is also included.

COUNTY and POST OFFICE EXISTENCE (INSERVICE)

Wyoming Post Offices 1850-1980 by John S. Gallagher and Alan H. Patera is the source for the inservice information. If a post office existed for more than one continuous period with the same name (see note below), then the "established date" is that for the first period and the


"discontinued date" is that for the last period. If the period between a closing and re-establishment was very long, the re-established period is not included but designated by an "r" symbol. Usually, a change to rural branch status ends the "inservice" period.

The following symbols represent additional information pertaining to the existence of a post office:

- A post office that was established, re-established or had a name change during the period post offices were supplied with Doane postmarkers.
- # This is a new name for an existing post office.
- * This post office continued with a new name.

NOTE: POST OFFICE NAME In this compilation, an addition or deletion of a space, apostrophe or hyphen IS NOT recognized as a name change for determining inservice dates.

- @ Indicates that BOTH # and * apply (when lack of space precludes use of both symbols).
- 2 or p2 The symbol p2 (or another number) denotes the number of periods a PO existed if re-established with the same name. The "p" is omitted if space is needed for another symbol.



DALLAS is the only Wyoming post office known to have received a type 1c(-2) Doane. This cover was cancelled in 1904.

POSTMASTER COMPENSATION

The postmaster compensations have been taken from the 1905 Official Register of the United States, Volume II.

The 1903 compensations should also be listed, but unfortunately there isn't enough space to include them without resorting to smaller type. However, these 1903 compensations were published in the Wyoming Collector of July 1989, Vol. 3, No. 3 as a special issue devoted to Wyoming Postmaster Compensations and may still be available from The Depot. The postmaster compensation listing is considered essential to the study of Doane cancellers because of the correlation (with a few as yet unexplained exceptions) between the number in the killer bars and the compensation. This was a major discovery by Bill Helbock as reported in "Postmarks and Cancellations" by Richard W. Helbock and Dan Meschter in La Posta, Vol. 17, No. 1.

TYPE, SUBTYPE & NUMBER


The three basic TYPE numbers follow the accepted convention.

There are three major subtypes for the type 1 Doane, and two each for types 2 and 3. These major subtypes are based on the lettering of the town and state. Within each major subtype exist many minor variations of lettering, numbers and killer bars. The minor varieties, however, are not considered here.

In many instances, no subtype is recorded because no example has been seen to make a determination. Many of these unidentified subtypes are those from the original list published in the Summer 1982 issue of <u>La Posta</u>, Vol. 13, No. 3/4, and no examples have surfaced to be able to determine the subtype. Many of these from the original list still remain the only recorded examples we have. If anyone has any of these, a report or, better yet, a photocopy would be appreciated.

The following represent the subtypes used in the present listing. The examples are 80% of the original size.

This subtype consists of small Gothic letters.



TYPE 1b

The lettering here is serifed, similar to the common 2a.



TYPE 1c

Broad Gothic lettering similar to 3a distinguishes this type.




TYPE 2a

This subtype of the doublelined killer bars has serifed lettering.



TYPE 2b

Small Gothic lettering was used for longer PO names.



TYPE 3a

This solid killer bar subtype has broad Gothic lettering.



TYPE 3b

Has Gothic lettering similar to the letters used in most 4 bars and is the more common type 3 subtype.



MISCELLANEOUS SUBTYPES (Symbols for any type)

x NONSTANDARD Any nonstandard device that mimics a Doane in some way.

m MODIFIED These can be a modification, such as removal of letters in the canceller, or when a part of a Doane canceller was joined with something else for a composite. CAUTION: "Type 1 killer bars" in a composite could be from an RFD canceller. Type 1b or Type 2a dials in a composite should be dated prior to the introduction of 4C 4 bars for easier confirmation.

NOTE: A "?" in the type or number column suggests that the type or number is questionable.

The breakdown by subtypes is as follows, with unknown subtypes indicated by "unk":

Earliest and latest known dates are listed for each major period that a Doane canceller was in use.

NOTE: A "?" in the date indicates that something is printed in the indicia but is not legible. If a blank space appears in the indicia, there is a blank in the recorded date.

YEARS REPORTED

The discovery of an earlier date is always important in determining when a Doane device was issued to a post office. A late Doane date along with an early 4 bar date is very helpful in determining when a Doane usage ended. However, an exceptionally late date does not generally represent the normal usage of a Doane device. The recording of all known cancels, except where there is

frequent duplication of dates, helps to give us a clearer picture of the history of a Doane canceller.

An "x" in the YEARS REPORTED column indicates that a Doane cancel is known for that year. As can be seen, the data is a bit sketchy even though a few towns may have several recordings; unfortunately, many are from the same year. More data here would be helpful.

A separate column has been provided for each year from 1903 through 1922. An entry in the last column represents a cancel for any year after 1922.





THE DIARY OF A POST OFFICE INSPECTOR IN 1896

The Post Office Inspector was the investigative branch of the postal service. It was their responsibility to investigate problems and losses within the service. Prior to the introduction of civil service, they were commissioned by the Postmaster General. This commission was for one year and could be renewed at the pleasure of the Postmaster General (PG). Instructions were issued that the inspector was to travel at the PG's direction. They were to be obeyed and respected by all personnel, and they were to be given free transportation by those companies carrying the mail.



In the 1890's, a Post Office Inspector stationed in San Francisco and assigned to Northern California and Nevada, kept a diary for a few years. I have one of these dated 1896. It begins on January 1 in Reno, Nevada, and ends on December 31 enroute to San Francisco. The inspector did not sign his diary, but we do know that he was married, lived in Palo Alto, and used the Southern Pacific to get to work. You will note the inspector worked a 6 day week and some Sundays. There are no entries in the diary as to time off, Sundays worked, or vacation time. From time to time, the inspector cancelled pages of the diary with stamps from the Post Offices he was inspecting. I can not tell if this was for proof of the visit or a personal reference marker.

The first month in the diary starts in Carson City and ends in Palo Alto on the 26th of the month. The reason for





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

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How Old is OLD?

To a grade schooler, someone in high school is "old"; to a college student, age 30 seems "old"; to those in the work force, the retirement age at 65 seems "old"; to our senior citizens, well, they may

define anything older than they are as "old".

Looking at it from a different angle, we might talk about the "living memory". What's the earliest national or international event for which you can remember having an awareness? Such historical events are usually defined by disasters - frequently by wars. Personally, I have vague recollections of the Korean War, and I know I followed the siege of Dien Ben Phu with some fascination, but World War II is something I was told about and read about. My children, born in 1977 and 1980, don't even have remembrance of the Viet Nam War; those older than I will have experienced World War II, and the Great Depression, and the Roaring 20's.

But beyond that, we're running out of "living memory". There are still those that experienced and remember World War I, but they are aged, and passing from us. The Spanish-American War is something their parents told them about, but it has passed from our nation's living memory. The Civil War is an event that no person living now has experienced - it's something we learn about from history books, or by tracking down the trail of

artifacts it produced.

You say you collect old covers? What do you mean by "old"? Some collectors focus only on stampless covers, or pre-Civil War. At least one collector I know collects only covers postmarked before he was born. World War I doesn't seem that awfully long ago - but if you have a "modern" cover from 1917, you can almost be certain that the writer, the recipient, and every one of their peers has died by now.

With each passing year the collective time of earliest memory also advances. In 25 years the living memory of World War II will have passed. In 75 years the Gulf War will be passing. The way we differentiate between "old" and "modern" today will be long forgotten. In 200 years, if there are still postal history collectors about, how will they define "old" and "modern" postal history?



... and speaking of old, it may be "old hat" to hear from postal history editors that they are in need of more fodder for the presses, but I really could use some additional contributions of articles. It would be nice to seem some articles for those states that are not frequently heard from - Oklahoma or Kansas or the deep south, but I would be delighted for material from any of the states that comprise the Central Section.


Sending and Receiving Cancels


A number of people have written comments regarding the elapsed time of mail sent, as evidenced by the sending and receiving marks seen on covers sent in the early part of this century. Many of them show remarkably speedy delivery times that are unmatched today, despite the advent of jet airplanes

and sophisticated mail sorting equipment.

One reader sends in photocopies of a cover sent from Lima to Oxford Ohio in 1913. The letter traveled the distance - a bit over 100 miles - in 13 1/2 hours. It was postmarked in Lima at 9 P.M. January 10 and backstamped at Oxford at 10:30 A.M. the next day. The sender says a letter traveling the same route today routinely takes three to four days, and that some have taken as long as eight days in the early part of 1991.

Another example of fast service is the post card sent from Wilmette, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago, to Georgetown, Massachusetts, a small town north of Boston. It's a distance of over 1,000 miles, with an elapsed time of 38 hours.

DOVER, KENTUCKY by Isabelle M. Jacobs

Dover, Kentucky, lies on the south bank of the Ohio River, ten miles west of Maysville, the county seat of Mason County, and fifty miles upstream from Cincinnati, Ohio. The village is situated at the highest point of any river town between Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Cairo, Illinois.

Pre-European settlement Dover was the home of the Adena Indians, the Mound Builders. A blockhouse was erected by the Washburn family in 1784 at the mouth of Lees Creek for protection against Indian attack and wild animals. Between 1792 and 1812 twenty to thirty log houses were built on the Dover bottoms, where Market and Hall streets now lie.


Arthur Fox, a surveyor, laid out the town in 1818 and gave it the name Dover after his native home in England.

In 1870 Dover was one of the largest shipping ports on the Ohio River. It had five tobacco warehouses. Large shipments of hogs and cattle




were made from Dover. There was a creamery, bakery, bank, drugstore, blacksmith shop, brickyard, wool mill, cotton mill, a dry goods store, a casket and cabinet maker, and of course a saloon. Later the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad was built through the town along Hall street.

On January 21, 1833 the town received a post office, with Stephen Thomas as the first postmaster. The post office was for many years located in a brick building on Market Street, near the railroad. Mail was received by train five times a day until about 1958, when it changed to the Highway Star Route.



The Citizens Dover Bank, which served as the post office from 1913 to 1968, when it was badly damaged by a tornado.




Dover, Kentucky post office in April 1985. Photo by Alan Patera.

Thirty-six appointments wre made before the 1913 flood, which caused the post office to be moved to a brick bank building nearby. Eight appointments have been made since then. Another flood in 1937 saw three feet of water in the post office.

The river was the first important means of communication for Dover. It was superceded by the railroad. With the passing of the railroad era, construction was begun on the Mary Inglis Highway (Kentucky Hwy. 8), which now provides modern travelling to Maysville and Covington.

In 1965, Dover post office was raised from fourth class to third class. The rural route established in 1905 was converted to an intermediate route in 1975. The post office now serves about 1200 customers.

Disaster struck this fair community on April 23, 1968, when a tornado roared through the area. About 80% of the 130 homes and businesses were destroyed or badly damaged. The post office, of which I was postmaster, was one of the casualties. I used the living room of my damaged, but still usable, home for 111 days for the receipt and dispatch of mail. Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Tabb, the owners of the destroyed post office building, purchased a prefabricated building from National Homes and placed it on the same site, leasing it to the Postal Service for use as the current Dover post office. The dedication for this building was held on August 11, 1968, using an American flag that had flown over the capitol building in Washington D.C.



PLACE NAMES OF PIKE COUNTY KENTUCKY by Robert M. Rennick

Pike County is the easternmost and the largest county in Kentucky, a rugged land of ridges and hollows. It is an area as rich in folklore as it is in coal. Settlements developed along the watercourses and adopted many strange and curious names, such as Huddy and Goody, Mouthcard and Pigeon. Pike County Place Names alphabetically lists the names of settlements and watercourses, explains how the name came to be applied, and provides information on the local history in an easy-to-read format. A table at the end of the book lists those places that have had post offices, providing dates of operation. Throughout the text there are photographs of past and present post offices of Pike County, and many examples of postmarks are illustrated.

SOUTH DAKOTA POST OFFICES

Alan H. Patera, John S. Gallagher and Kenneth W. Stach

This book is an essential reference for anyone interested in South Dakota history. It is designed for collectors of postal history - postmarks on cover or on postcard from the many communities that have dotted the South Dakota landscape. It did not take much more than an application and a bond to get a post office established during the years 1880-1900 -- the years when South Dakota was experiencing intensive settlement. Many hopeful crossroad stores had post offices that have long since disappeared. With the information in this book you can trace the progression of settlement by the post offices. The postmasters frequently represent the predominant family names, from which you can identify areas of Scandinavian, German, even Dutch settlement. The postmaster compensation suggests the prosperity of the community, as for smaller offices the compensation was equal to the gross receipts of the post office. The maps provide locations - also given by Section, Township and Range - for all but of few of the post offices that have operated in South Dakota.

In any reading or research, should you come across a place name that is unfamiliar, <u>South Dakota Post Offices</u> may well provide the information you need.

The book includes:

Historical introduction; Operating dates for post offices, including branches and stations; Location, by Township and Range where possible; All postmasters through 1971; Postmaster salaries through 1911; R.F.D. carriers 1907-11; Maps of each county showing post office locations; A list of RPO routes that had a terminus in South Dakota; Alphabetical index.

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DOANE CANCELS OF TENNESSEE by Paul Phillips and Bob Toal

The listings presented here are much less extensive than those presented for many other states, as the list has been in prerparation for less than a year, and only three entries have been sent in by La Posta subscribers since our names first appeared. Nevertheless, we believe it is important to publish what we do have in order to catalyze some input. In the following list when there is no entry under the Doane number heading, it is because in those cases we are not certain that the mark is a Doane as the number section was illegible. Most of these instances are Type 2, as evidenced by the double line character of the obliterator bars.

Some notes of interest are as follows:

1. So far we have only actually seen two examples of Type 1 Doanes, those of Beershiba Springs and Triune. All others are from a La Posta listing of Type 1 Doanes of some time ago.

2. The last reported example of a Doane is of Spurrier, and is a last day of service of the post office in 1932. We would like to hear of any other examples. In order to ascertain whether or not the mark was in continuous use or simply pulled out of a drawer for the last day servicing.

The Robbery of Train #13

The desperados who robbed trains in the last quarter of the last century have names familiar to many of us, as they have been written up so often in books, and again committed their crimes before motion picture and television cameras.

Not as well-known was the hold-up of a passenger train in southern Oregon on October 11, 1923. The Southern Pacific en route from Portland,

Oregon to San Francisco, California was stopped and blown up 8 miles north of the California border just as it emerged from a tunnel in the mountains near Siskiyou, Oregon. The train included a mail car which the hold-up men believed carried very valuable registered mail, as well as securities being forwarded to the banks in San Francisco.

The train traversed the tunnel very slowly, and only the locomotive, coal tender and mail car were out of the tunnel. The plan of the robbery was simple. Two of the three men in the party were to board the coal tender at the tunnel's northern end and make their way to the locomotive, ordering the engineer to bring the train to a halt as it exited the tunnel. The third man was waiting at the tunnel's southern end with a container of dynamite. His job

was to place the dynamite at the entrance to the mail car, set to blow off the door as it exploded.

There was too much dynamite in the bag and it did much more damage to the mail car than just blowing the door off. Worse yet, the explosion set fire to the contents of the mail car. Then the attendant in the mail car was shot and killed as the robbers attempted to enter it. This was all to take place within a few minutes but the burning mail slowed the process.



To prevent their identification by the only people who had seen them, the train's engineer, brakeman and fireman were all slain in cold blood, now making a death toll of four men. They made their escape, foolishly leaving behind one of the revolvers they used and a pair of overalls, not knowing that parts inside the weapon were numbered. The gun was traced to a Seattle gun shop where it was found to have been bought by a William Elliott.

The most incriminating evidence was in one pocket of the overalls - a postal receipt for a registered letter which had been sent by a Roy DeAutremont. Comparison of a DeAutremont signature with the one for the gun purchased by William Elliott disclosed that both had been written by the same person.

The authorities concluded from records which

they had studied that the three men were the DeAutremont brothers - Hugh, Ray and Roy. The federal authorities issued more than two million wanted posters with their pictures and they were displayed in every Post Office in the country, as well as in employment offices.

The men enjoyed four years of freedom. Shortly after the crime, Hugh enlisted in the United States Army and was sent to serve in the Philippines. Another soldier in the barracks noticed his photo in a circular posted in an Army Post Office; DeAutremont had not even bothered to change his name. Today a computer would have identified him in seconds. He was then arrested and held over for trial in Salem, Oregon.

His two brothers were working in a steel mill in Steubenville, Ohio and even though they had changed their names and grown mustaches, they were identified and sent to Salem to be tried along with Hugh.

Loy A. A. DeAutremont, alias R. A. Harris, alias R. A. Burton, age 23 in 1923; weight 135-140 pounds; height 5 feet 6 inches. Complexion medium light, Hair medium light brown. Eyes peculiar looking, narrow and squinty, light brown. Wears glasses in reading. Face broad at the check bones. Nervous, and a "dreamer." Likes to argue against the Bible. Long, turned upness and prominent nostrils. Tonsils have been removed. Head round. Wears No. 6 shoe. Boastful and egotistical. Clips his words. Forward and presuming with women. First upper right molar tooth has amalgam silling, as have both first right and left lower molars.

Ray and Roy signed confessions to the train robbery and slayings. Hugh pleaded not guilty, but all three were convicted and sentenced to life in prison. Ray was paroled in 1961, two years after Hugh had died of cancer. Roy, who was given a frontal lobotomy, was paroled in March of 1983 and died of cancer three months later.

Ray took employment as a custodian at the University of Oregon in Eugene after Oregon's governor commuted his life sentence. When Ray was asked by a reporter why he had performed such a bold and conscienceless act, he replied:

"Why does anyone do the things he does? I suppose at that time I was carrying more than my share of adolescent neurosis. I read that we got the idea from reading Jesse James stories, but I don't think so. Other people have read those stories, but it did not make them do what we did."

The last great train robbery is displayed in the albums of collectors of postal history because of the handstamps that were placed upon the charred covers that survived the explosion. A 3-line handstamp read:

> DAMAGED IN WRECK OF **ASHLAND GERBER TRAIN 13** AT SISKIYOU OREGON. 11,1923.

Salvaged mail from this disaster is very rare. I only know of three examples that have come up in the almost ninety years since it happened. The

most recent example sold for \$120 in the auction of a small stamp dealer.

Not quite as valuable are the reward notices put out by the Special Agent of the Southern Pacific Company in San Francisco. This notice carries the photos of the three brothers, with their signatures. So that they may be identified by opticians and optometrists, the prescriptions for their glasses are given with the suggestion that "they may secure new glasses soon." The assitance of dentists was sought by listing the condition of the teeth of all three men, listing the dental work that each one had had. Watch repairmen and jewelers might help by knowing that Roy had a 7-jewel Waltham watch, size 16, open face, gold filled case. The number on the case was 4298547 and the movement number was 22444312. A private mark on the back of the case was 11693HB. Ray's watch was an Excelsior, movement number 667501, size 16, with 8662 as a private mark inside the case.

Both Ray and Roy enjoyed reading books on poetry and sociology and often spent time at libraries reading books of this nature. They liked the company of women and were very forward with them.

The only one with a criminal record was Ray, who had served a one-year term in the reformatory at Monroe, Washington after World War I for participating in anti-government activity which today would be regarded as political activity.

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U.S. POSTAL HISTORY

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More on MLOCR Spray Markings


Response to my article in the July issue of LaPosta was surprising and shows that many LaPosta readers are interested in these relatively new jet-spray markings. Henry Beecher pointed out that the reduced rate for bar-coded mailings did not begin until April 1988.

The technology, however, is not new. An Optical Character Reader (OCR) made by Philco was first tested in the Detroit Post Office in 1965. In 1969, later models made by Philco and IBM were tested in Boston and New York post offices. the early 1970's an Integrated Letter Mailsort System was tested in Cincinnati. This system employed a Multi Line Optical Character Reader (MLOCR) and memory capable of storing a portion of the ZIP + 4 directory. It was a forerunner of what we are seeing today, but at that time, its price was prohibitive.

These sprayed-on bar codes were postal markings, but not postmarks.

As explained in our previous article. the recent installations of Multi Line Optical Character Readers (MLOCR's) can read all the lines of an address, compare it with the ZIP + 4 directory in memory, and spray the proper 9 digit bar code on the envelope. They also have the capability of spraying a second line which can be programmed for each machine and often includes data normally seen in a postmark.

Through the courtesy Westbury, in the Automated Systems Division of USPS at Washington, DC, we now have a record of where this equipment is located (see Appendix 1). procurement of 402 MLOCR's resulted in their placement at 168 locations around

adopting low-cost OCR's capable of reading only the bottom line of an address. This equipment was first tested in Dallas in 1979. The result was the installation of 252 OCR's and 248 bar code sorters (BCS's) between 1982 and 1984.

In 1976, a Post Office Task Force | the country between January 1988 and May 1989. Every state was represented except Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming. A second procurement will add 425 more MLOCR's between September 1990 September 1992. and Montana, North Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming will receive MLOCR's during the first five months of

1992. I did not see a scheduled delivery for an Idaho post office.

So far, examples from 28 cities have been reported to me by <u>La Posta</u> readers with the earliest being reported by Alfred Tetrault. It is postmarked Stamford CT Aug 29 1989, just about a year after USPS reports the equipment available for that post office.

However, Bart Billings, editor of Machine Cancel Forum, reports that he has received a list of about 50 offices from which MLOCR spray postmarks have been seen, which he will publish in the October 1991 Machine Cancel Forum.

Why haven't more cities been reported? Well, the spray line that shows the name of the post office, etc. is optional and apparently not activated at all locations. For more information, visit one of the offices listed in Appendix 1 and ask about their MLOCR installation.

Meanwhile, keep your eyes open and put aside any envelopes that you receive with these sprayed postmarks. They will be the "Doane" postmarks of the electronic age.

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
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
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
