BOOK REVIEW

Ellis, David M., MICHIGAN POSTAL HISTORY, THE POST OFFICES 1805-1986. Lake Grove, OR: The Depot, 1993. Hardbound, sewn signature, 8.5x11 inch format, 552 pages: Available from The Depot, P. O. Box 2093, Lake Grove, OR 97035. \$50.00 postpaid.

Dave Ellis' massive listing of the post offices of Michigan has been long and eagerly awaited by the many students of Bay State postal history. Michigan, particularly the Upper Peninsula, enjoys considerable popularity among postal historians, and it is a bit surprising that a published listing of the state's post offices has lagged behind similar lists for Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa. Never-the-less, now Michigan is in print, and a "monster" it is!

The book begins with an alphabetical listing of all post offices with county; dates of establishment and change; and disposition (discontinued, name changed, etc.). This is followed by a county by county listing of post offices which features a county locator map, notes on county history, railroads in the county and the alphabetical post office listing. A fair number of covers and cards are illustrated, but intended only as space fillers or decoration, rather than to make a point regarding postmark varieties. The last section, a short one, lists post offices established in Michigan and later transferred to other states.

It's a fine effort by both Author Ellis and Publisher Patera, and I am pleased to recommend the publication to any and all collectors interested in Michigan postal history. A word to the wise, however, the print run was limited to 300 copies and I've no doubt that this first printing will sell out quickly. It may be a while before a second printing becomes available.

By the way, The Depot is a publishing company owned and operated by Alan Patera and John Gallagher. It has no connection with La Posta Publications, and, while we can pass on orders for publications of The Depot, you will receive much faster service by contacting them direct through the address listed above.

POSTAL HISTORIAN OR COVER COLLECTOR?

By Jim Hale

Postal history is a term that is often misunderstood, and that's too bad. Many stamp collectors don't know what postal history is, or how to turn it into a comprehensive specialty, even though it is a well-established, widely recognized branch of philately. My experience in presenting programs on postal history to local stamp clubs shows that while club members' knowledge of postal history may be limited, their interest in the subject is apparent.

Too many collectors who call themselves postal historians are interested only in acquiring a cover from each post office in their chosen geographical area. They often restrict themselves further to a given time period, such as the 19th century. These folks, of course, have the right to collect what they wish, but they are really just cover or postmark collectors, not historians.

There is so much more to postal history than simple cover collecting that it is frustrating to find people threatening to give up their postal history specialty because good covers have become scarce and too expensive. What they don't seem to realize is that postmarked covers only open the door to a long list of other activities that are equally important for learning the history of the mails. And such learning won't cost an arm or a leg, either.

Postal history needs to be looked at as an area of study; not solely a form of collecting covers. Here is a list of things postal historians need to know. How many of them have you explored in your own area of postal history interest?

POST OFFICE LOCATIONS. Where were they located, and for how long? The early, smaller offices changed often as postmaster appointments were political and new postmasters could pick their own sites.

MAIL ROUTES. Where, and by what means was the mail carried between post offices? Mail-hauling contracts go back to the earliest days of the U. S. postal system.

POST OFFICE NAMES. What is the source of the name? Naming stories are many and varied. Good books and articles in historical journals chronicle the naming of places in many of our states.

STATIONS AND BRANCHES. Where and when were post office sub-units located and what kinds of postal markings did they use?

POST OFFICE STAFFS. Who were the post-masters and clerks and when did they serve?

RURAL FREE DELIVERY. Determine when the service started, number and location of routes, any special postmarks used, names and periods of service of route carriers.

RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE. What railroads and railway post offices served your study area, and what postal markings did they use?

20TH CENTURY POST OFFICES. Many post offices were born and have died since 1900. Information about these 20th century offices and covers from them are just as important as from any other office.

AIR MAIL. When and where did air mail service begin? First flight and airport dedication covers are collectible.

METERS AND PERMITS. These are the orphans of postal history. Most post offices in the last 75 years have used them. They represent a valid postal service that should be documented.

POSTAL MARKINGS. All post offices have used many types of postmarks, cancellations, and other markings including handstamped and machine markings on letter mail, rate marks, registration marks, parcel post cancels, transit and receiving marks and various auxiliary markings.

FIRST AND LAST DAY COVERS. The opening or closing of a post office has often been commemorated with special covers. There's no real reason to ignore them.

SPECIAL EVENT COVERS. Local organizations, with the assistance of their post offices, often sponsor special postmarks or cacheted cover to celebrate an event. These can be collected, too.

INFORMATION SOURCES. Knowing where to look for information on local post offices is an immense help. Try searching county history books, other local history publications, old maps and photographs, historical societies, files of old newspapers, libraries, publications of postal history groups, the philatelic press, other collectors and older resi-

THE SILENT BOX: The Story of Mina, California

This day in June started out in its typically hot fashion that one learns to bear with in the Ukiah Valley, but the higher I climbed into the northern mountains the cooler the temperature became. The road, though now mostly paved, is still time consuming, taking near two hours to reach my destination of Mina.

Coming to the final pass, one can look for miles in Round Valley where the mountains hover over the small town of Covelo. Beyond are even higher mountains, covered with snow left from the long cold winter. It is here that one can travel for miles in such quietness that only the breath of nature is heard.

Climbing north up out of Round Valley, the road becomes dry and dusty, with long serpentine turns that wind in and out of old oak trees, standing like sentinels guarding the way to what once used to be the old town of Mina.

As I dropped down into the flat where only the ghosts of Mina abide, I could see the two story red house, sitting up on the knoll being shaded by a




Figure 2. Mail delivery boxes in Mina, California, circa 1922.

At the crossroads were several ornately designed mailboxes built on stilts, with peaked roofs to weather the high snows of the country (Fig. 2).

For a practical purposes, the mailboxes were the town. Except for the few farm houses, scattered throughout the valley and owned by such families as the Cummins, the Scheubecks, the Terry, the McKinleys and the Reeds, there was nothing to be found of Mina.

Off in the distance I saw a few puffs of dust. All of a sudden, I could see an old car, driven by the local mail contractor, cresting the hill headed for the Reed's home.

Just as I rounded another bend in the road, a rush of cool air blew against my cheek, rousting me back to reality. And there was no house on the knoll! And standing along side of the road was only one weather worn mail box, still built in the same fashion as its predecessors. Etched on a piece of wood were the letters "MINA", which was set into the peak of the mailbox. This was all that remained of the town of Mina, and at last contact I understood everyone who lives in the area now picks up their mail from this one central post box (Fig. 3).

Fourteen years ago I started to research the postal history of Mendocino County, California. Mendocino County is about two hours north of San Francisco. At one time, in the thriving lumber days, there were well over one hundred post offices operating in this county, with the earliest being Fort Bragg.

The first project I chose to do in my research was the postal history of Mina, a community which was once located a few miles north of Covelo. I had a remote idea of where this place might have been, but it was so small, and so much time had lapsed since the town had officially been taken off the map, that I figured no one would be able to give me any needed information. To my surprise, I was happily proven wrong.

At that time I was writing a local column regarding the county's postal history, and I asked in my column if anyone knew the location of Mina, thinking that I would probably get very little response. In the next few weeks floods of letters and phone calls came my way. It was through these people, familiar with the area, that I was not only

able to identify the location of the town, but was able to meet relatives of the one time postmaster.

I had heard so many stories from early settlers that when I finally made my journey to the area it felt as if I were returning home after a long absence. The area and people had been described so intensely that I could almost "see" each house and person who lived there. Unlike the lumber towns on the coast, this area was generally settled by farmers and ranchers.

One of my curiosities was why this area was named Mina. One lady informed me "the post office was named Mina by vote, for a young woman homesteading in the community". This very well could have been as later I was given an article that included these few lines,

"Miss Mina Caldwell came up from Oakland the first of the month to live on her claim. Miss Caldwell's sister, Miss Josie, came with her to remain for some time."

Settlers came to this area in the late 1800's to claim their homesteads. In 1893 the Almar Reed family came from Freshwater, which is near Eureka. He and his wife, Leota, their two children -- Margaret and Lura Bell, started out in their big wagon drawn by four horses, taking six days to complete the trip. They traveled south until reaching this area in the far north of Mendocino County. Here they filed a claim in the area that eventually became known as Mina.

Along with them they brought their worldly possessions, which consisted of a one horse buggy, three colts, and a small variety of household belongings. The hard ground replaced down quilted beds, and food was prepared over open camp fires. Before leaving for the Mina area, Leota baked enough bread to last the trip.

A few years ago I had the opportunity to meet Lura Bell Reed McKinley, daughter of Almar Reed. The memories of those days were still very real for her. She told me that her grandfather had gone before them and built a cabin. She clearly remembered arriving at the cabin and seeing her grandfather standing in the doorway to greet them.

Her father was lucky enough to file a claim that already had a cabin on it. To make their claims for this land, the men folk took a four day, one way, trip to Ukiah.

The Reeds lived in this small cabin until the family began to increase, and Almar built a larger

house of poles and shakes. It was here the youngest of five children were born.

The first post office was established to serve the Mina community on June 26, 1914. Verda R. Wilson was the first appointed postmaster. Almar N. Reed succeeded Mrs. Wilson on November 29, 1919, and he served in that position until June 30, 1926, when Russell W. Cummins became Mina's postmaster. Cummins was the last of the Mina postmasters.

Unfortunately, the heavy snows closed the passage of the mail routes during some of the winter months. A "John J." wrote in the local paper that:

"Our mail service has been interrupted by the snow storm for nearly two weeks. The snow being from three to four feet deep on Lake Mountain, it has been impossible for the mail carrier to make regular trips."

In the early 'twenties the mail contract was held by J.W. McKinley (Lura Reed's husband) for eight

years. Most of these years he carried the mail by horseback, with his route being from Mina to Hoaglin. At one time "the mail was carried six

times a week -as some people
moved away and
the store my father
owned was closed,
it was carried three
days a week."²

The post office had several locations, depending upon who was serving as postmaster at the time. The office was usually in the postmaster's home, but its "last location was in a part of a detached building, shake or pole type, part of which was used as a post office and the rest as a storage space."

After Almar Reed passed away in 1926, Russell W. Cummins became postmaster. It was during his time in office that the people of the area began to realize that their mail was taking an extremely long time to arrive. Especially during the cold winter months when the snow packed the mountains and water lapped at the river's edge.




Figure 6. This map shows the location of Mina in far northern Mendocino County.

The incoming mail was brought by train to Alder Point in Humboldt County. It was then carried by horseback to Zenia, then on to Hoaglin and Lake Mountain in Trinity County and finally along Lake Mountain Road to Mina.

In the early 'thirties a group of men got together to make a four day trip to Ukiah to ask the postal service if the mail route could be changed. Their request was granted, and mail service was rerouted

from the south through Covelo.

For 24 years this little community struggled to maintain its own post office, but, finally, on August 31, 1938, the Mina office was closed and mail service was provided from Lake Mountain. In 1953 that office, too, was discontinued, and since then the few remaining residents of Mina have been serviced from the Covelo Post Office.

Now all that remains of Mina are memories, dusty roads, a single post box, and -- thanks to many people who cared -- a lot of old postmarks and photos.



Post Offices of Klickitat County, Washington

Klickitat County was brought into existence by the act of December 20,1859. Being carved out of Walla Walla County, it was the 18th county formed by Washington's Territorial government.

Rockland, the first post office, was opened on November 20, 1860, and closed on February 14, 1865. The office received mail through The Dalles, Oregon. Rockland remained the county seat until 1879, even though there had been no formal town on the site since 1865. A vote to change the county seat to Goldendale failed in 1872, despite the fact that the majority of the population was centered around Goldendale. Cattlemen of the county were primarily responsible for that failure. The Rockland office re-opened briefly between May 4, 1882, and August 20, 1883, but generally there was no post office at the site of Rockland until 1892, when Grand Dalles was established on December 28th of that year.

Three years later, Grand Dalles became Granddalles, as Post Office Department dogma began to favor one-word post office names. The old spelling was restored in 1909, and remained unchanged until 1932, when the office was renamed Northdalles. On December 1, 1937, the site of Northdalles was moved approximately one mile north, and the office was renamed Dallesport. This office remains open today.

The second post office in Klickitat County was not established until 1870 - five years after the Rockland office closed. Klickitat, established July 14, 1870, was a short lived office. John Golden, an early settler in the area, hired a surveyor and had town platted. Shortly thereafter, Golden purchased the post office building and, with the consensus of a local gathering the name of the town was changed to Goldendale.

Golden's actions did not please all local residents, and a few disgruntled citizens decided to re-establish Klickitat in May 1872. The office remained open, on and off, until 1880 but it was nothing more than a rural facility, operating out of the home of the postmaster. Klickitat post office was generally some five miles south of Goldendale, moving with each new postmaster.

The year 1872 found two other post offices opening: Columbus and Block House. Block Huse was named after the Bockhouse fort built back in

the 1850's during local Indian uprisings, and was located seven miles west of Goldendale. Mail was brought from The Dalles along the route to Yakima

Columbus was located on the Columbia River. approximately 20 miles east of Rockland. The town was never :very large, and its destiny was probably changed with the arrival of Sam Hll, railroad magnate. Hill had big plans for the little town. He saw a large, beautiful city situated to overlook the Columbia, and he had plans drawn accordingly. In 1907, Hill tried, unsuccessfully, to have the name of the little town changed to Maryhill. Hving failed at this Hill won approval of a post office located one mile northeast of Columbus in 1909, and named that facility Maryhill. The office closed four years later for lack of patronage. Hill's dream of a large city neve came to fruition, but the name Maryhill was finally adopted. It replaced Columbus in 1922. The Maryhill post office rmained open until 1963, at which time it was converted to a rural station of Goldendale.

Another early Klickitat County post office was White Salmon. Established on December 12, 1870, this office was originally located one mlle west of present-day Bingen. In 1886, when Mrs Hunsaker became postmaster, the office was moved to its present location up on the bluffs overlooking the Columbia. At this location, little town grew to become the county's second largest city. Mail service was originally by way of Hood River, Oregon, across the river, and was tri-weekly. Through the years White Salmon has been a dispatch point for many of the post offices in the western end of the county, In fact, White Salmon has three star routes today. One route goes to the Snowden region. The second and third go through Husum to Troutlake and Glenwood respectively. Since 1894, the majority of offices along these routes have been serviced through White Salmon

In the 122 years of post office activity, Klickitat County has seen some 83 offices, Of that number only 16 remain open, including the rural station (now Community Post Office) out of Goldendale. Of the 67 digcontinued offices (DPOs), 46 (70%) were open for 10 years or less, and 33 (50%) of those were active for only five years or less. Consequently, examples of postmarks from many Klickitat offices are quite difficult to find. Even so, the relative scarcity of these postmarks only adds to the challenge and excitement of collecting the postal history of Klickitat County.


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POSTMARKS OF WASHINGTON TERRITORY

Part 17 - Klickitat County

In this series we are cataloging all the postmarks that were used on first-class mail in Washington Territory. Earliest markings were in the very early 1850's; latest ones appear right up until state-hood was granted on November 11, 1889.

As is customary in the field, we catalog the markings by county, and here is the list of our articles to date:

You will note that there is no apparent reason for the order in which counties appear. I chose this order so that the earliest articles would cover counties for which I had the greatest number of postmarks, hoping that sparser counties would fill in as we went along. I feel that I owe an apology to collectors of Lewis County, especially Ken Burden, who has been so helpful to me, sending many photocopies of covers. I put off Lewis County for awhile so that I could gather more information to help clear up some confusion about Cowlitz offices.

My articles follow the standard form we have seen used for other states. Post offices are listed by alphabet, and each postmark is cataloged in order by date of first known use.


Numbers in parentheses after PO name show years that the office operated. In first column beneath name we show number assigned to marking: in second we give actual number of examples of the marking that are known to exist to date. Third column shows general type of marking: MANuscript, REGistered. Circular Date Stamp (with diameter). OCTagonal, OVal, etc. The next 2 columns show earliest & latest dates of known use of marking, from postmarks examined recently. Last column shows type of killer used to cancel stamp. which is usually consistent for each postmark.

Our greatest source of information is you, the collector. We have cataloged markings in most of the larger collections, but you will note that there is much yet to be discovered. There are many offices for which we record no known markings, and there are many markings yet to be discovered, even though we may already have a marking or two from that office. Especially difficult are offices that were open briefly in very early days, and offices that were only open for a year or 2 before statehood. There are many offices that are well covered after 1889, but that were opened in 1887 or 1888, and so we have no actual territorial period records.

Even for known markings, you may have a date extension for us - an earlier or a later date of use than we have recorded. Every one is important to us, even for common offices. If you have information please send it along; especially worthwhile are photocopies of covers. Send to Richard Long, PO Box 472, Bandon OR 97411. Phone 503-347-3824. CENTERVILLE 1 is a unique cds with very dim but readable block letters. Landis reports a county postmark, but does not say whether it is territorial.

CLEVELAND 1 is a unique manuscript, sold in the April 1992 Kaufmann auction.

COLUMBUS 1 is a rare manuscript, with 3 reported to date. Two are reported as "W.T.", and the other as "Wash. Ter.".

COLUMBUS 2 is a unique cds on a 3¢ envelope.

DOT 1 is a unique manuscript on a 2¢ envelope.

FULDA 1 is a unique sawtooth cds.

FULDA 2 is known in just 2 examples. One was sold in the April 1992 Kaufmann auc.

GOLDENDALE 1 is a unique manuscript marking.

GOLDENDALE 2 is unique, appeared in April 1992 Kaufmann sale, with photo.

GOLDENDALE 3 is by far the commonest postmark of territorial Klickitat County.

GOLDENDALE 4 is unique, in an Oregon collection.

GOLDENDALE 5 is a 3-circle cds; see McBride's auction May 1984, registered rct.

HAPPY HOME 1 is a rare manuscript, known in just 2 examples.

HARDISON 1 is a rare manuscript; both appeared in McBride's sales; 1980 & 1988.

HARTLAND 1 is a unique cds with a deceptive 5 in year; it looks like a 0. Chase-Cabeen correctly copied it as a 5 in their illustration, but they state that there was a "postmark seen dated 1880". Undoubtedly someone incorrectly reported this or another blurred 1885 to them, and they missed the connection.

HIGHLAND 1 is a unique manuscript marking.

HUSUM 1 is known only from a report in Landis of a marking that reads, "Husum, W.T./M. Thompson, P.M.". He does not illustrate it.

LUNA 1 is known in 3 examples, all in purple indelible pencil at bottom of cover.

LYLE 1 is a rare cds known in just 3 examples to date.

NEW LEBANON 1 is a unique manuscript marking.

WHITE SALMON 1 is known in 5 examples; only 2 attributed to year. WHITE SALMON 2 is known in 4 examples; see Landis, also April 1992 Kaufmann auc.



Let's Get The Lead IN: The Sparks Shot Tower

The matchlock gun was introduced in Europe at the end of the fifteenth century. Its mechanism was simple in theory, but quite cumbersome in practice, and a precise series of time-consuming steps had to be followed in order to fire such a weapon. Loose black powder was first poured into the barrel and gently rammed to the bottom. It was essential that the powder not be lumpy or it would burn slowly instead of igniting spontaneously. A leaden ball and a wad were then rammed in, and finer powder was inserted into a priming pan on the outside of the barrel. A match applied to a touch hole activated the powder and the bullet was propelled.

The flintlock firing mechanism, which alleviated the clumsiness of the match, was probably invented by Marin le Bourgeoys, an artist, sculptor, locksmith and clockmaker in Normandy, at the beginning of the seventeenth century. This type of firearm literally played a significant role in shaping the future history of the world. Through his inventiveness and ingenuity, Marin designed the flintlock to possess a strong, smooth action with a good safely device.

Two hundred years later, the Reverend Alexander John Forsyth, an ardent hunter, exasperated because he was unable to bag the ducks that he should not have missed, decided that the loss of his prey was not his marksmanship, but lay in the flash of gunpowder that superseded the discharge of his bullet. He theorized that the ducks could see the flash created by the flintlock, rendering them an extra split-second opportunity to disperse. He experimented with metallic salts called fulminates, but found that they did not flash as reliably as did gunpowder. In 1805, he designed a new type of percussion lock that closed off all egress of the flash except to the bore of the rifle. He found this to work well in the field, and his daily bag of ducks swelled.

Seven years later, Samuel Jean Pauly of Paris, utilizing Forsyth's principles, invented a breech, or cartridge loading mechanism. This type of weapon possessed a firing pin for ignition, instead of a flint. It was not until the 1840's that another Frenchman named Flobert produced a self-contained unit, the prototype of the modern bullet. In the 1850's, two Americans -- Horace Smith and Daniel Baird Wesson -- developed both a rim-fire cartridge and the

accompanying revolver for it, opening the era of the cartridge guns.




Figure 2. The Shot Tower is encircled. Source: Lynch's The Old District of Southwark In the County of Philadelphia.

At the end of the eighteenth century the United States was totally dependent upon European lead shot for its weapons. As is still our contemporary concern regarding products not manufactured within out country, an embargo in 1808 against trade with Great Britain created a lead shot "crunch" in the United States. To forestall a crisis, two patriotic entrepreneurs -- John Bishop and Thomas Sparks --erected the first shot tower in America in the Southwark District of Philadelphia. It was located on Carpenter Street, between Front and Second Streets, and was built for the express purpose of providing lead shot for sportsmen (Figure 2).

The cornerstone of the building was laid on July 4, 1808 (Figure 1.) The tower was 142 feet high, from the ground level to its summit, and extended 25 feet underground. The wall base was 30 feet in diameter with the wall thickness being 32 inches. The diameter at the top was 15 feet. It was

said that the United States Lighthouse board was so impressed with this edifice that it was studied by them and copied as a model for lighthouses.

The concept of production of shot was rather simplistic. Liquid lead was poured through a pan located at the height of the tower. This pan contained perforations that were the size of the shot desired. The molten shot were dropped into a receptacle of cold water located at the base of the tower. It was found that the purer the lead, the more perfectly spherical the shot.

After striking the cold water, the chilled shot was ready for use. 4,5

When the War of 1812 erupted, Bishop and Sparks immediately received purchase orders from the Government for their products. Bishop, being a devout Quaker, retired from the business, for conscience sake, leaving Thomas Sparks as the sole proprietor.

In 1838, Thomas Sparks, namesake nephew of the above proprietor, Joined his uncle. When the uncle died in 1855, the business was manned by nephew Sparks until his death in 1874. At that time, Thomas W. Sparks, nephew Sparks' son, became the legitimate owner.²

The establishment's business office was located at 121 Walnut Street. The factory produced up to five tons of shot per day, although its full capacity was twenty tons. Sparks boasted that the Bullet Works, located in a separate but nearby building, by virtue of its mechanical technology, was capable of

producing bullets as perfectly spherical as the drop shot.

To the rear of the shot tower lay a neglected old cemetery, which in 1909 was described as having been almost totally obliterated by "time and the refuse of the neighborhood". The few remaining gravestones were dated from between 1797 to 1800.

A series of interesting photographic panoramas of the Southwark area of Philadelphia were taken in 1870 from the top of the tower. The reader is referred to Robert E. Looney's Old Philadelphia in Early Photographs.

A second tower, known as Beck's Shot Tower, was erected in Philadelphia somewhat later in 1808.

Sparks' Shot Tower was closed in 1907, nearly a full century after its inception. Advancing technology had turned the shot tower into a hulking, shadow-casting dinosaur that may momentarily turn the head of the occasional tourist. An inner city recreation center was later created at the base of the tower by the City of Philadelphia.

LIST OF RAILROAD-RELATED MAIL SERVICE INTERRUPTIONS WHICH OCCURRED IN THE UNITED STATES

Eighth in a Series

By Henry J. Berthelot

[Reader's inquiry: In regard to INTERRUPTION NO. 1931-11-22, a reader wrote that he was puzzled by the reference to the accident at Lexington, Missouri having occurred on a through Missouri Pacific train from Chicago, Illinois to Kansas City, Missouri. He observed that the Missouri Pacific did not reach Chicago, and although that Line was a dominant route between St. Louis, Missouri and Kansas City, it was never noted for through traffic from Chicago. One reason was that there were several fast and direct (and shorter) lines between Chicago and Kansas City. Referring to the 10 January 1931 Russell's Railway and Motor Bus Guide, the reader further observed that Lexington, Missouri was on a Missouri Pacific branch line from Sedalia, Missouri to Kansas City. However, only an all-stops local operated each day between those two cities, plus a mixed train. The Guide did not indicate that the branch line was considered a through route, and no through trains were shown, except those that connected with main line trains at Sedalia.

More puzzling to the reader was MARKING NO. 1931-11-22. He stated that Oelwein & Kansas City would be an RPO on the Chicago Great Western, which indeed had through service between Chicago and Kansas City. But that service did not go near Lexington.

The writer will dwelve into this interruption more closely and report any additional information that may be ascertained. In the meantime, the writer appreciates the responses that he has received relating to this series of articles, especially the cogent comment that is outlined above.]

INTERRUPTION NO. 1943-09-18

This is another one of those railroad mishaps about which the writer has not been able to find any information, except the details that were noted on the Postal Office notice and derived from the cover. [Does anyone have any more knowledge in regard to the events which surrounded this interruption?]

On the night of 18 September, a fire began in a storage car on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway line while the train was between Fort Worth and Gainesville, Texas. After the fire was extinguished, the mail was collected and sent to Gainesville for processing. There, a two and five-eights inch high by five and three-eights inch long notice, printed in red, was prepared over the name of then Gainesville Postmaster Cecil H. Tinsley. The notice, dated 20 September 1943, accompanied each damaged item that was returned to the mail.

In this instance, a New York business had posted a letter to a gentleman in Lyford, Texas. The letter, forwarded from Lyford on 17 September (as evidenced by the backstamp) to Partis, Kansas, came to grief while en route to Partis. Owing to the severe fire damage sustained by the envelope, postal officials returned the letter in an ambulance to the New York sender.






Ambulance (reduced) used by postal officials to return the envelope seen above and deliver the notice concerning this mishap

INTERRUPTION NO. 1937-08-22

The information herein was derived from the reply of the Superintendent of Mails at Los Angeles, California to a letter from a Los Angeles collector regarding the two covers illustrated. The covers were part of the mail damaged or destroyed on 22 August in a storage car fire on the Omaha & Ogden Line between Omaha, Nebraska and Cheyenne, Wyoming.

The mail was salvaged as much as possible and reworked at the Ogden, Utah terminal. The recovered mail was forwarded to Los Angeles via Ogden & L.A. Train No. 5 and processed en route. One of two handstamps were utilized to identify the mail items involved. The handstamps were affixed in magenta.

This mail arrived in Los Angeles on 25 August 1937.







INTERRUPTION NO. 1940-03-10

An interesting letter accompanied the envelope used to illustrate the postal marking that is associated with this interruption. Seems a colonel in Chevy Chase, Maryland ordered a console via mail on 9 March 1940 from E.H. Scott Radio Laboratories Inc. of Chicago, Illinois. That letter was damaged and delayed owing to its being involved in a postal car fire en route. The company's president, explaining the delay in shipping the console, returned the colonel's envelope and noted in the third and fourth sentences of the second paragraph that "The stamp [postal marking] on the back of the envelope indicates that the postal car in which this letter was carried burned. If you are a philatelist this [envelope] will prove a very interesting addition to your collection." Wonder if Mr. E.H. Scott was a collector? He was perceptive!


The writer has not been able to locate additional information on this mishap. Does anyone have more details about the events that surrounded this fire? A double-line handstamp, struck in magenta, notified the recipient that his mail had been "DAMAGED BY FIRE/POSTAL CAR BURNED".





ASPECTS OF NONMAILABILITY

Part V: Albino Envelopes

by James H. Patterson

Albino envelopes are unglamorous things to illustrate. At least in the case of the two albinos described here, we have clear "unmailable" markings to allow us to show you something more than a blank box. Please note -- and this is critical to our discussion -- that both of these covers are albino window envelopes.

The cover illustrated in Figure 1 is an albino of the 2-cent round (as opposed to oval) Washington stamped envelope series in use from 1916 to 1932. Its Scott catalog number is U429. It bears a nice Universal "Air Mail Saves Time" machine slogan cancellation applied in Newark, N.J., on Feb. 5, 1929. It also carries a 2-line "Unmailable" handstamp in a fancy typeface with serifs, with the second line consisting of the numeral "16" -- presumably the

clerk who apprehended the culprit and applied the marking.

The cover shown in **Figure 2** is of the same series. It reproduces in a darker manner because it is the blue (rather than white) envelope paper variety, and is Scott No. U432. It has a single straight-line "Unmailable" handstamp. Someone has circled the albino embossed postage stamp with a pencil -perhaps a clerk; perhaps an insensitive collector or owner sometime during the past six decades. It bears, on its reverse, a machine cancellation from San Francisco and dated April 29, 1927.

The Printing of Embossed Envelopes. The first step in the printing of stamped envelopes of this era was the cutting of the envelope blanks, that is, the unfolded, unembossed and unprinted envelopes. The blanks were then fed into the printer-and-embosser. The printer-and-embosser had two separate inking rollers if the envelopes were being printed with "corner cards," which is the postal name for a printed name and return address of the sender.



Albinos were produced when two blanks went through the printer at the same time. Both received the embossing, but only the top envelope was inked. When an albino was produced, the corner card (if being printed) was printed only on the top envelope, but not on the bottom envelope, since it was printed at the same time, and on the same press, as the stamp.

If window envelopes were being printed, an additional step was involved: the cutting of the window from the envelope blank, and the affixing of the glassine over the window opening.

Finally, the envelopes were folded, counted and boxed.

Analysis. Why are these two specimens unmailable? As is most often the case, the general listing (Sections 86 through 99) of "nonmailable" matter in the contemporaneous *U.S. Official Postal Guide* of July, 1926, provides no illumination.

The next step is my three-part analysis: Does it violate some public policy? Is it harmful or injurious? Or does it run afoul of some technical rule or requirement? An albino envelope hardly is contrary to public policy, and it is hard to imagine how it could be dangerous to postal workers.

By the process of elimination, the determination of the nonmailability of these two envelopes must have been based on a violation of a postal rule or regulation.

Fortunately, we are not left merely to speculate. The 1926 **Postal Guide** does contain other provisions which give us the answer: Section 110, dealing with window envelopes generally (which would include privately-produced, nonstamped envelopes, as well as the official products, such as those shown as Figs. 1 and 2); and a group of sections (24 through 34) dealing with "window stamped envelopes" (that is, postal products) and "return card on window envelopes."

Section 110 covers the necessary physical attributes required of all window envelopes and their contents: the placement and size of the window, for example; prohibitions against advertising or printing around the window; the color of permissible enclosures, etc. Section 110 also contains the following paragraph about "corner cards":

Such envelopes shall bear the card of the sender; that is, the name and address of the sender, which shall be placed in the upper left corner of the address side. The return card of

the sender, to be complete as to the address, must show not only his name and the name of the post office and State, but when the post office is one having letter-carrier service must also show a street address or number of post-office box rented by him. The mere name of a building will not suffice for a street address. Although it is preferred that the return card include the sender's name, the latter may be omitted from ordinary mail bearing the sender's post-office box number and post-office address.

Two more subparagraphs follow, and Section 110 concludes as follows:

"Window" envelopes not conforming to the foregoing are unmailable.

Section 34 ["Return Card on Window Envelopes"] amplifies and reiterates the return-address requirements:

34. Return cards on all window envelopes, including window stamped envelopes, must include the following:

(a) Name of sender or, in lieu thereof, the post office box number or street address, the latter only when the purchaser is the sole occupant of the premises.

(b) Street address, when the post office is one having city delivery service, or number of post office box in lieu thereof. (The mere name of a building will not suffice for the street address, but may be printed in addition to street address.)

(c) Post office and State.

Window envelopes not conforming to the foregoing, as well as to the other requirements prescribed by section 110, page 21, of this Guide, are unmailable.

[Emphasis in original]

Both of the envelopes shown in Figs. 1 and 2 bear faint impressions where the printed corner card should have been. Figure 3 illustrates the back of the envelope whose obverse is illustrated in Fig. 2. There

is no doubt of who the sender was, based upon this display. Unfortunately for the Ry-Krisp Company, its extensive advertising on the back of the envelope did not solve the missing corner card problem. The *Postal Guide* required, very explicitly, the sender's street address to be shown on the front of each window envelope.

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Exhibiting County Postal History: An Alternate View

Martin Margulis' article, "Confessions of a 'Novice' Exhibitor," in the July 1993 *La Posta* was very intriguing. Very little has been written in the philatelic press on exhibiting a county postal history collection. As a collector of "local" postal history and an APS accredited national-level judge, I have long felt the exhibition of county postal history is an area that needs discussion and analysis. Many collectors get their start in postal history by acquiring covers from their home city or county. Inevitably, some want to exhibit their material. Often it is their first foray into the world of exhibiting. While these exhibits do not get big awards, they are some of my favorites.

I have seen and judged many county exhibits. While I always enjoy them, most never receive a high award at a national level show. To differ with Mr. Margulis, the national-level silver award he received for his Orange County, New York, exhibit is a very respectable award for such an exhibit. Many county postal history exhibitors never achieve that level. When judged by the high standards required for postal history at the national level shows, most county exhibits have serious problems. Why is that?

When judged by the high standards required for postal history at the national level shows, most county exhibits usually have serious problems.

Most novice exhibitors do not realize the challenge that they face with a county exhibit. The postal history of your average county is actually a difficult area to exhibit. The postal history of a nation (or one specialized aspect of it) or the history of a major city are both easier exhibits to construct. That does not mean the material is easier to acquire. With those subjects, it is easier to create an exhibit that tells a comprehensive postal history "story". Within recent memory, I can recall excellent exhibits of Philadelphia, New York City, Baltimore and Chicago. On the other hand, I can recall only one county exhibit that I thought was exceptional, an exhibit of Howard County, Maryland, that I judged at Balpex a few years ago. While it was an exceptional county postal history exhibit, it still did not win a gold medal.

My very first exhibit, over ten years ago, was a postal history exhibit of a North Carolina town in a local stamp show. It was displayed once and hasn't reappeared. Since then I have created national and international award-winning traditional and thematic exhibits. I have attempted to start exhibits of my "local" postal history material on several occasions, but none of these attempts ever made it to the exhibition hall. I felt my material fell short in some area or I had not done the needed research, so I put aside exhibit plans. But I keep the collecting and hoping to exhibit some day.

So if you want to undertake a county postal history exhibit, what are the common problems? Here are some things that the potential county postal

history exhibitor should keep in mind.

1. The exhibit must show postal history. It must display the development of postal service in the county through the use of covers and official documents. Many experienced exhibitors fall into the trap of concentrating on the general history of the county. They tell the history of towns, industries, or some interesting local anecdotes and then display the postmark of the place. The postal "story" is only incidental to their text. The main concentration of an award-winning exhibit must be on the development of the post offices, the routes between them, and the services provided by those offices. While it is often true that establishment of post offices paralleled the development of towns, the exhibitor's thrust must be on the post offices, and only incidentally mention the growth of the area. In two examples from my own collecting area, the post office in Warm Springs. N.C., in the 1840's was located in the town's resort hotel. The owner of the hotel was the postmaster. It is appropriate to include these facts in an exhibit. In another case, the Asheville, N.C., post office was in a general store when the town's first large hotel, the Eagle, opened in the 1850's. It is not appropriate to include that fact in an exhibit, since the hotel had no direct connection to the post office.

2. A postal history exhibit cannot be merely an exhibit of postmarks or cancels. Far too often, the county postal history exhibitors arrange their covers alphabetically. Some judges call it the "phone book approach." This is the kiss of death for such an exhibit. This arrangement conveys virtually no postal history information and almost guarantees a low

national level award. The postal history story must be explained by use of postmarks and other postal markings on covers. The postmarks should support the history, not the reverse.

- 3. The postal history exhibit must have a logical development. The story line must "hang together." County exhibits can usually be organized by one of two methods: chronology or geographic areas. In the chronological approach the exhibitor starts with the earliest postal development and continues forward in time demonstrating each development or advancement in postal service. This approach usually works best in a relatively homogeneous county. In the geographic approach, the county is divided into logical areas and the postal development is examined in each. For example, a county might be divided into early river settlements, the mountain area, the railroad settlements, and the remote rural areas. Each of these areas has its own postal history story with its own unique aspects. Together they tell the story of the whole county. A county postal history exhibitor must decide which approach tells his county's story best while highlighting the outstanding philatelic items in the collection. Certainly these are not the only approaches possible. Judges appreciate innovative methods which successfully explain the postal history and showcase the philatelic material.
- 4. The exhibitor must demonstrate philatelic knowledge. The exhibitor must show that the he or she understands the philatelic significance of the material being exhibited. Rates and markings should be explained. If a stamp is a scarce variety that is not obvious to the viewer, it should be mentioned in the text. A county postal history should include some "interesting" items such as covers to foreign destinations, postage due covers, or examples of special delivery or other less common services.
- 5. The historical and philatelic information in the exhibit must be correct. The exhibitor must do the necessary homework. Judges take a very dim view of incorrect statements. An exhibitor can deprive himself of a higher award because of erroneous information on a couple of pages. While the lack of money or luck, may excuse defects such as poor condition of covers or missing items, there is no excuse for erroneous statements. A county postal history exhibitor has the heavy burden to be knowl-

edgeable in both the historic and philatelic aspects of his area.

6. The exhibit must be comprehensive. This is a common pitfall of many county exhibits. They have large gaps in time or significant postal developments are not demonstrated by the material shown. In some cases, it is sufficient to show one postmark of an office that lasted a hundred years, but usually not. It is likely that the office used several types of postmarks. In another situation, if the first office in the county was established in 1815, and the exhibit's first cover dates from 1845, the exhibit has a serious problem. What happened postally in the 30 years between 1815 and 1845? Perhaps there is a good reason for this, such as all known earlier examples are in archives or college libraries. Such information should be presented in the exhibit to show both the exhibitor's knowledge and to indicate that the exhibit is as comprehensive as possible, given the limits of the material.

In the end, the county postal history exhibitor must accept the fact that his exhibit may never win a national gold medal, no matter how complete or perfect.

These six items are definitely not everything that can go wrong with a county postal exhibit, but they are some of the most common problems.

In the end, the county postal history exhibitor must accept the fact that his exhibit may never win a national gold medal, no matter how complete or perfect. The majority of counties do not have postal histories which offer a broad philatelicscope. They do not contain philatelically "flashy" like postmaster provisionals, unusual stampless markings, or foreign ship mail. They usually cannot demonstrate most aspects of postal history of the nation. While the covers in the county exhibit may be scarce or even unique, they will still pale beside an exhibit of New York City postmaster provisionals or Mississippi steamboat mail in the eyes of most collectors or judges.

However, most county postal history exhibits do quite well in local or regional exhibitions, especially if they concern the local area. Many of the viewers are familiar with the area and can appreciate it more. This is not to say that county postal history exhibits should not be entered in national level competitions. By all means, for a challenge, exhibitors

should work on their exhibits and reach for the higher national awards. One must realize that the top awards are not given out easily; exhibitors work hard to get them. And county postal history exhibitors must work harder that others because of inherent problems in their subject.






Figure 1. This cover was mailed by a corporal in the 15th Bombardment Squadron (Light) through APO 875, which was located at Kettering, England. The 15th Bomb Squadron, which initially flew American-built Bostons belonging to the RAF, was the first American air unit to engage in combat in Europe. Six crews of the 15th joined six RAF crews on July 4, 1942, in a raid against German airdromes in Holland.

CENSOR MARKINGS ON U.S. ARMY MAIL IN 1942

American military planners began to examine

strategies whereby the United States and Great Britain might eventually coordinate their efforts to defeat Germany as early as the fall of 1940. Of course, U.S. entry into the war was still more than a year in the future, but a number of fairly detailed plans were developed. It was the existence of these plans which



permitted the United States to react rather quickly following the Pearl Harbor attack. In fact, some four thousand men of the 34th Division arrived in Belfast, Northern Ireland in January 1942. Thus began a concentration of American Army and Air Corps

personnel in the United Kingdom which would reach 170 thousand by the end of 1942, but many hundreds of thousands more before the war was won.

UNITED KINGDOM

Although details of the joint military planning efforts changed throughout 1941, the primary areas of American focus in coming to the aide of Britain were seen to be twofold: first, to begin a troop buildup which would initially relieve British forces in Iceland and Northern Ireland for redeployment elsewhere, but would lead eventually to an Allied invasion of Europe; and, second, to supply American aircraft and crews to be based in Britain for bombing raids on Germany.

Northern Ireland

The first U.S. Army Post Office to be established in Great Britain was located at Victoria Barracks, Belfast, Northern Ireland. Records indicate

that APO 813 was established 29 January, but the first contingent of 4,500 men of the 34th Division reportedly arrived in Belfast on 26 January. Among the first arrivals were the 133rd Infantry Regiment (Iowa National Guard), the 109th Combat Engineers, the 109th Medical Battalion and the 109th Ordnance Company.

The 34th Infantry Division was initially planned to be one of three divisions to compose Force Magnet, the U.S. relief force for the British garrison of Northern Ireland. As it turned out, however, the 34th was the only infantry division sent to Northern Ireland, and a lack of available British escort vessels delayed

arrival of the final elements of the division until 13 June. Beginning in May, after the 34th reached sufficient strength, units began relocating to Omagh, Northern Ireland, for a continuation of training. At this time APO 34 began servicing the postal needs of the division.

Of additional interest is the fact that mail from U.S. servicemen using APO 813 is typically franked with British postage (1 shilling, 3 pence air; 2 1/2




Figure 3. APO 34 began servicing the postal needs of members of the 34th Infantry Division once the bulk of the division had arrived in Northern Ireland.

pence surface) until April 1942. From that time on, surface mail to the U.S. is free franked and airmail bears 6 cents U.S. postage. The free franking privilege was granted to members of the armed forces by Act of Congress passed March 27, 1942. It first appeared in *Postal Bulletin* No. 18418 dated April 1, 1942.

The 1st Armored Division arrived in Northern Ireland beginning on 16 May. Within a month the entire division had arrived. The 1st Armored Divi-

sion was initially garrisoned at Castlewellan, Northern Ireland, but in late October the Division was transferred to Northwich, England. APO 251 served the postal needs of the men of the 1st Armored Division.

The concentration of U.S. forces in Northern Ireland, which had been originally foreseen as growing to a strength of three infantry divisions and one armored division, called for a higher level of command. As a result, V Corps was established with headquarters at Lurgan, Northern Ireland in May 1942. APO 305 served the mail requirements of V Corps headquarters.

The Eighth Air Force

On 8 January 1942 the War Department established USAFBI (United States Army Forces in the British Isles) under command of Major General James E. Chaney, who had been serving as the special U.S. Army observer at



the American Embassy in London since May 1941. General Chaney, an Air Corps officer, spent a great deal of time before the U.S. entered the war traveling around Scotland, Northern Ireland and England evaluating sites for air bases and installations. No APO was authorized for the USAFBI Headquarters in London until 10 April. At that time APO 887 began operations. On 24 June the USAFBI was

redesignated ETO-USA (European Theater of Operations, United States Army), and General Dwight David Eisenhower assumed command.

On 22 February the first American air headquarters in Europe, U.S. Army Bomber Command, USAFBI, was established under command of Major General I.C. Eaker at High Wycombe. Throughout the spring of 1942, General Eaker and his small staff coordinated efforts with the RAF to prepare for the arrival in Great Britain of American forces. Meanwhile, on 5 May Major General Carl Spaatz formally assumed command of the Eighth Air Force at Bolling Field, Maryland.

Advance echelons of the Eighth Air Force began arriving in England on 11 May. The main ground forces sailed on board the Queen Elizabeth from New York on 4 June and arrived six days later. By the end of June 1942, units of the Eighth Air Force in Great Britain consisted of the 97th Bombardment (Heavy) Group, the 1st and 31st Fighter Groups, the 60th Transportation (Troop Carrier) Group, the 15th Bombardment (Light) Squadron (Separate) the 2nd and 5th Air Depot Groups.

Ground elements of the 92nd and 301st Heavy Bombardment Groups, the 14th Fighter Group and the 64th Troop Carrier Group all sailed from the U.S. late in July as their air echelons simultaneously prepared to cross the air bridge from Presque Isle, Maine to Scotland by way of Newfoundland and Greenland. By the end of August, 386 aircraft (164 P-38 fighters, 119 B-17 bombers and 103 C-47 transports) had successfully crossed the North Atlantic ferry route.

Once arrived, elements of the Eighth Air Force were dispersed throughout Great Britain, with the greatest concentration located in England. Eighth Air Force Headquarters was initially established 18 June in the London suburb of Bushy Park, Teddington. APOs were established at many locations throughout England, Scotland and Northern Ireland in 1942. Some of these served the postal needs of specific units. Others served a cluster of military units assigned to the same geographic location.

The distribution of Army Air Corps units in Great Britain became even more complicated in the fall of 1942 as the Twelfth Air Force was assembled,



partially from units of the Eighth Air Force in England, in preparation for Operation TORCH, the invasion of North Africa. Table 1 lists all U.S. APOs established in Great Britain during 1942 in numerical order along with their geographic location(s), the military unit(s) they served, and their date of establishment. The locations of these APOs are displayed on Map 1.

Censor Markings






Figure 5. These are the only two types of handstamp censor marking typically found on 1942 U.S. Army mail from troops assigned to Great Britain.

All mail from U.S. Army and Air Corps personnel assigned to duty in Great Britain during 1942 bears censor markings of the familiar 5-digit boxed oval design or the small circular "PASSED BY/BASE/XXXX/ARMY/EXAMINER" (Figure 5). The author has seen no examples of provisional or special censor markings, and even the use of manuscript censor markings without accompanying boxed oval handstamp is unusual. It would appear

that, unlike most of the other geographic areas we have considered in this series, Army censorship of mail from troops in Great Britain followed well organized regulations from the earliest days and that proper, uniform censor handstamps were available to censor officers from the beginning.

While such precision and uniformity of regulation is no doubt admirable in a military organization, it makes for rather uninteresting collecting activity when compared, say to the "wilds" of censorship in Alaska in the spring and summer of 1942. Never-the-less, their are patterns to be found among the distribution of boxed oval censor handstamps in Great Britain, and where there are patterns there are opportunities to do research and build collections.

Table 2 displays the distribution of 5-digit boxed oval censor markings arranged according to

the first three numbers in each handstamp. Data are based only upon the approximately

two hundred 1942 examples of censored U.S. Army mail from troops in Great Britain in the author's collection. With such a small sample from which to draw inferences, all opinions stated with regard to distribution of the 5-digit censor hand-stamps in Great Britain should be considered speculative and subject to revision as more data becomes available.

Five digit number series noted in the boxed oval handstamps used in Great Britain during 1942 range from 080xx to 124xx with the overwhelming majority being either series 100xx or 110xx. Numbers in the 111xx series are known only on mail from members of the 1st Infantry Division and numbers in the 124xx series are known only from the 29th Infantry Division.

It would appear that the 100xx and 110xx series censor handstamps were distributed to virtually all censor officers at units on duty in Great Britain prior to October 1942. The lower numbered series, i.e., 080xx - 094xx, appear to have been used by units involved in training for Operation TORCH. It is known that several TORCH units continued to use censor handstamps with numbers in these series once they reached North Africa, but data is quite fragmentary here.

It is not clear why the occurrence of numbers in the 101xx to 104xx series is so limited on mail from mail from troops in Britain in 1942, and no numbers in the 105xx to 109xx range have been seen although they might be anticipated given the emphasis of 100xx and 110xx series numbers.

MICHIGAN

Postal History: The Post Offices, 1805-1986 by David M. Ellis

This book is a gigantic 556 pages, full of information on Michigan post offices. It contains the usual information for a postal history work -- an alphabetical listing for the state, complete coverage by county, including establishment dates, and discontinuance or name change dates -- not only for the post offices, but for all branches and stations as well. The information has been exhaustively researched and cross-checked to ensure accuracy. There is an easily readable map for each county, and in the county lists there is a map reference as an aid to locating the post office. The book contains many illustrations of interesting covers from the author's collection. A useful addition to the standard post office fare is the inclusion of information on railroads that have operated in each county, including all the stations and the distance from the starting point.

The book is printed on cream-colored 60 lb. book paper, sewn and cloth bound.

20TH CENTURY NON-STANDARD POSTMARKING & CANCELING DEVICES

Part 23 - Catalog Section, New Discoveries

By Randy Stehle and Doug DeRoest

This section presents new discoveries for types that have previously been shown. Virtually every non-standard cancel type has had new discoveries since the time we introduced it in *La Posta*. The 19th century mimics (Type A), except for the star killers, are well represented in these new reports. In fact, we have doubled the number of known wheel-of-fortune killer (Type A.5) non-standards from two to four.

There are 20 new Doane mimics (Type B) reported here for the first time. This significant number may be attributed in large measure to the publication of *United States Doanes*. Several state Doane coordinators showed illustrations along with their listings. Some of the "killer unknown" cancels --most of which had their killers cut off when they were turned into cur squares by collectors of an earlier era -- turned out to be Doane mimics.

There appears to have been a common manufacturer for some of the Doane mimics. One Doane mimic type looks like a normal Type 3 Doane, except that the cds portion measures 28 millimeters or less (normal Type 3 Doane postmark dials measure about


32 mm.). North Carolina has three such mimics: Highlands, Lillington and Pantego. The distribution of these mimics must have been widespread, however, since we know of examples from states as far afield as Wyoming (Wind River), Montana (Harrison) and West Virginia (Cannelton).

New discoveries in the area of pseudo machine cancels (Types E.1 and E.2) reflect the tendency of a post office to have used more than one type of non-standard device. Corunna, IN, is represented by two new types which bring the number of recorded pseudo machine cancels used in that office to three. In addition, Boardman, OR and Roslyn, PA were both previously known to have used pseudo machine cancels. Now both offices are known to have used two different types. Lake Grove, NY was previously known to have used two different pseudo machines and Silver Lake, MN had been logged in with three different

The rate of growth in the total number of non-standard cancels recorded has predictably slowed over the Christmas and New Year holidays. Our number currently stands at 3,119, up 45 over last time. "YELLOWED" TO BE HISTORY

July 1, 1971, was one day that first day cover collecting was really meaningful -- and it was fun! And it has been fun and educational ever since.

Remember - This was the first day of the new United States postal service -and

The first day for Scotts # 1396 -- and also


The stamp was "on sale" at every U.S. post office -- and, finally,


The new USPS "issued" an "official" envelope, which was supposed to be available at every post office throughout the country.

Thirty million first day covers were made; some are gems. Just look at the cancel available from Rome, NY 13440; a real "nice piece" of modern postal history!

SEQUIN, WASHINGTON, DOANE DISCOVERED

Pictured below is a recently discovered cover that is significant for at least two reasons. First of all, the postmark is a previously unreported Doane cancel, type 3/4, from Washington state. Washington Doanes are believed to be fairly well documented in





United States Doanes, and any new town discovery is significant.

The second important feature is that the name of the town is misspelled. According to *Washington Post Offices*, the post office at SEGUIN was established in Clallam County on August 13, 1879. On September 21, 1907, the name of the office was changed from SEGUIN to SEQUIM, and the Sequim

Post Office still operates today. The postmark shown here is a combination of the letters from these two names, and reads "SEQUIN." The return address gives the town name as "Seguin."

The postmark is likely to have been in use for less than 27 months. The earliest it could have been used was July 1905, when Type 3 Doane distribution began, and the latest should have been September 1907, when the name of the office was changed.

dents of the community. Much valuable information on post office activities and personnel is available from the National Archives and Records Service in Washington, DC.

This is not a complete list, but it indicates the scope of studies you can undertake to learn more about the post offices in your area.

To really put meaning into postal history, sharing problems and information with other collectors is a must. Experienced collectors can advise beginners, and all collectors should keep in touch with their peers.

What it boils down to it this. If your interest in postal history is sincere, be more than just a cover accumulator. Investigating the background of those covers and the post offices where they originated can be fascinating, inexpensive, and just plain fun.

BOOK REVIEW

Van Dam, Theo, WAR DATES, 1911-1950. Published by the Author, 1993. Plastic spiral bound, stiff cover, 80 pages. Price \$13.00 postpaid in US & Canada from Postal Covers, P. O. Box 8809P, Anaheim, CA 92812-0809.

Theo Van Dam, the heart and soul of the Military Postal History Society for long these many years, has produced this unusual listing of significant military dates arranged by country for the first half of the twentieth century. The book is divided into chapters covering the prelude to WWI, WWI, the League of Nations era, plebiscites and Allied occupations, Mandated Areas of the Middle East, the prelude to WWII, and WWII and its aftermath.

Illustrated with 11 maps, the book contains 1,250 data points arranged according to 138 country listings. The purpose of the listing according to its author is to provide researchers "an awareness of the exact dates of the beginning and end of hostilities. the date an area was occupied by opposing forces. and when new nations emerged from the fray." It is impossible, for this reviewer to judge whether the purpose has been completely fulfilled, but, knowing Theo and his penchant for detail, I'm willing to bet that he has made an heroic beginning.

This should be a useful book for postal historians with any interest in military covers of the 20th century. The price is quite fair, and I heartily recommend the book.

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
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
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
